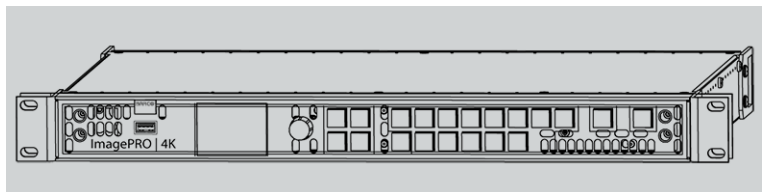

## 2.1 General considerations

### General safety instructions

## 2.3 Important safety instructions

### To prevent risk, personal injury, and ImagePRO-4K video processor damage

Please read this chapter carefully. It includes several cautions to prevent damage to Event Master devices. Ensure that you understand and follow all safety guidelines, safety instructions and warnings mentioned in this chapter before installing Event Master devices. After this chapter, additional “warnings” and “cautions” are given depending on the installation procedure. Read and follow these “warnings” and “cautions” as well.

- Read and follow all installation and operation instructions.
- Only trained technicians may install ImagePRO-4K products.
- Only use attachments/accessories specified by the manufacturer.
- CAUTION: Troubleshooting must be performed by a trained technician. To reduce the risk of electrical shock, do not attempt to service this equipment unless you are qualified to do so.

- Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel. Servicing is required when the system has been damaged in any way, such as liquid has been spilled or objects have fallen into the system, or the system has been exposed to rain or moisture, does not operate normally, or has been dropped.
- Do not remove any covers or panels during normal operation. Removal any of these items will expose sensitive electronic circuits and the unit may be damaged.
- During maintenance operations, always switch off the device and unplug power cords before removing one of the covers.
- Always wear a wrist band which is connected to the ground while handling the ESD sensitive parts.
- Wear insulating gloves during the execution of the installation and maintenance actions to avoid short-circuit.

## 3.1 ImagePRO–4K video processor overview

### About the ImagePRO–4K video processor

- **Superb performance**  
In 2004 the Folsom ImagePRO revolutionized HD video processing for live events. The ImagePRO–4K continues and extends that legacy, processing signals from XGA to full 4K60p 4:4:4 10-bit. The latest I/O connectors enable you to convert HDMI 2.0, DP 1.2 and 3G – 12G SDI signals, while also enabling output image rotation.
- **Road-ready and reliable**  
Like all Barco image processing products, the ImagePRO–4K is built for life on the road. Assembled and tested for extreme use and abuse, the ImagePRO–4K performs just as well at the gig as it does in the shop. The live-source view on the front panel provides you with a clear view of the incoming signal giving you the confidence you need to execute your event.
- **LED at your fingertips**  
Need to slice and dice LED signals? The ImagePRO–4K can either chop up single inputs across several connectors, or drive multiple walls from multiple sources. The LED set-up menu guides you through the process.
- **External control**  
You can remotely control all ImagePRO–4K features from a computer, using the Event Master Toolset (EMTS) GUI. With the easy-to-use pages, menus and graphics of the EMTS, you can, for example, upgrade system firmware, run test patterns, and control inputs and outputs. For more information about the EMTS GUI, refer to “Event Master Toolset”, page 101.  
You can also operate the ImagePRO–4K remotely using a Barco Event Master EC-30/50/200/210 controller.

## 3.3 Terms and definitions

### Area of Interest (AOI)

The portion of the output display that a video image occupies.

### Computer Video

A generic term indicating video that originates from a computer platform. A progressive scan signal that follows VESA (Video Electronics Standards Association) standards, with typical resolutions of 800 x 600, 1024 x 768, 1280 x 1024, etc.

### DisplayPort (DP)

Digital display interface developed by the Video Electronics Standards Association (VESA). This royalty-free interface is primarily used to connect a video source to a display device such as a computer monitor, though it can also be used to transmit audio, USB, and other forms of data. VESA designed it to replace VGA, DVI, and FPD-Link. Backward compatibility to VGA and DVI by using active adapter dongles enables users to use DisplayPort fitted video sources without replacing existing display devices.

### Event Master Toolset (EMTS)

Event Master Toolset Software is an easy to use GUI running on a PC or MAC. It provides all the Event Master series processors with control and configuration.

### High-Definition Multimedia Interface (HDMI)

HDMI is a compact audio/video interface for transferring uncompressed video data and compressed/uncompressed digital audio data from a HDMI-compliant device ("the source device") to a compatible computer monitor, video projector, digital television, or digital audio device. HDMI is a digital replacement for existing analog video standards.

### High-Bandwidth Digital Content Protection (HDCP)

A standard for encryption, defined by Intel Corporation to prevent copying of encrypted digital audio and video content.

### Logo

A full-screen still image that you can capture, import, and store for subsequent display by the ImagePRO-4K video processor.

## Menu

A scrollable list of options available on the front-panel display or the EMTS GUI.

## National Television Standards Committee (NTSC)

The oldest standard for color picture broadcasting. NTSC is a standard definition format that operates at a frequency of 59.94Hz, with 525 lines, 59.94 fields and 29.97 frames per second.

## Phase Alternating Line (PAL)

PAL is the predominant TV standard in Europe. PAL is a standard definition format that operates at a frequency of 50Hz, with 625 lines, 50 fields, and 25 frames per second.

## RGB

A color space that represents color as the red, green, and blue color signal components.

## Serial Digital Interface (SDI)

SDI is a serial link standardized by the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers (SMPTE). SDI transmits uncompressed digital video over 75-ohm coaxial cable within studios, and is seen on most professional video infrastructure equipment.

## Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers (SMPTE)

A professional association that develops and publishes video-related standards.

## YCbCr

A color space that represents color as brightness and two color difference signals. Y is the brightness (luma), Cb is the blue-difference (blue minus luma: B-Y) and Cr is the red-difference (red minus luma: R-Y).

# 3.4 Unpacking and inspection

## General

Before shipment, all the devices were inspected and found to be free of mechanical and electrical defects. As soon as the devices are unpacked, inspect for any damage that may have occurred in transit. Save all packing material until the inspection is completed. If damage is found, file claim with carrier immediately. The Barco Sales and the Service office should be notified as soon as possible.

## Unpacking

At delivery, Event Master devices are packed in a shipping case. Place the shipping case of the device on a stable (solid), flat and insulated support during all the unpacking. Open the case from the top. Remove the device that is packaged in an antistatic bag. Check the box content after unpacking.



After unpacking let the device acclimate to the room temperature which must be higher than 0°C (32°F) and lower than 40°C (104°F). Neglecting this may result in startup failure of the device.



When shipping an ImagePRO-4K video processor in a Barco-supplied case, make sure that the rear connector protectors are installed to prevent damage.



Save the original shipping case and packing material, these will be necessary if you ever have to ship your device. For maximum protection, repack your device as it was originally packed at the factory.

## Mechanical check

This check should confirm that there are no broken parts and the unit is free of dents or scratches. Your Barco Sales representative should be notified as soon as possible if this is not the case.

## 3.5 Installation requirements

### Environmental conditions

The unit must always be mounted in a manner which ensures both air inlets and outlets are free. For installations in environments where the device is subject to excessive dust, it is highly advisable to take measures to prevent the dust from reaching the unit. If this is not a feasible, then the unit should be relocated to a different dust-free location.

It is the customer's responsibility to ensure at all times that the device is protected from the harmful effects of hostile airborne particles in the environment of the device. The manufacturer reserves the right to refuse repair if a device has been subject to negligence, abandon or improper use.

The table below summarizes the physical environment in which the ImagePRO-4K video processor may be safely operated or stored.

### Site preparation

The environment in which you install your ImagePRO-4K video processor should be clean, properly lit, free from static, and have adequate power, ventilation, and space for all components.

Do not install the device in a site near heat sources such as radiators or air ducts, or in a place subject to direct sunlight, excessive dust or humidity. Be aware that room heat rises to the ceiling; check that temperature near the installation site is not excessive.

## Rack-mount installation

The ImagePRO–4K chassis is designed to be rack mounted and is supplied with front rackmount hardware.



The ImagePRO–4K chassis can also be used in a “tabletop” configuration, without rack mounting.

When rack mounting the ImagePRO–4K chassis, remember the following important points:

- The ImagePRO–4K chassis is 1RU in height.
- The maximum ambient operating temperature is 40°C (104°F).
- Leave at least one inch of space (front and rear) to ensure that the airflow through the fan and vent holes is not restricted.
- When installing multiple units into a rack, distribute them evenly to prevent hazardous conditions that may be created by uneven weight distribution.
- Connect the unit only to a properly rated supply circuit.
- Reliable grounding (earthing) of rack-mounted equipment should be maintained.
- Rack mount the unit from the front rack ears using four rack screws (not supplied). Threads may be metric or otherwise, depending upon the rack type.

ImagePRO–4K units are shipped with side rails included in the shipping case and not installed onto the chassis. These side rails, when they are properly installed and adjusted, assist with the distribution of chassis (and cable) weight within your rack. Use the following steps to properly adjust the side rails:

1. Measure and install the two supplied mounting brackets on your rear rack rails.

2. Measure the distance between the front and rear rack rails. Remove the mounting screws that secure each side rail to the chassis, and then adjust the spacing of each side rail as necessary. The ImagePRO–4K uses two mounting screws on each side rail.

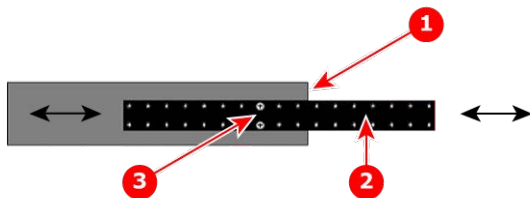


Image 3-3: ImagePRO–4K chassis with side rail and mounting screws

1. Chassis rear
  2. Side rail
  3. Mounting screws
3. Re-install the mounting screws. When properly adjusted, the end of each side rail will protrude through the slot in the rear mounting bracket, once the chassis is rack mounted.
  4. Lift the chassis, and while supporting it, slide the side rails through the slots in the rear mounting brackets.
  5. While continuing to support the chassis, install and tighten the two lower screws.
  6. Finally, install and tighten the two upper screws in the rack rail.

## Cable and adapter information

The table below provides information regarding cables used with the ImagePRO–4K. When connecting to an ImagePRO–4K, use high-quality shielded cables.

### Power cord and line voltage selection

The ImagePRO–4K is rated to operate with the following specifications:

- Input Power: 100-240 VAC, 50-60 Hz
- Power Consumption: 2A maximum

The ImagePRO–4K performs line voltage selection automatically. No user controls are required. The AC power cords must be accessible so that they can be removed during field servicing.



**WARNING:** When used above 230 volts, a UL listed line cord rated for 250 volts at 15 amps must be used and must conform to IEC-227 and IEC-245 standards. This cord will be fitted with a tandem prong-type plug.

The rear panel ON/OFF switch does not disconnect the unit from input AC power. To facilitate disconnection of AC power, the power cord must be connected to an accessible outlet near the unit.

Building Branch Circuit Protection: For 115 V use 20 A. For 230 V use 8 A.

## 4.1 Front panel

### About the front panel

See Image 4-1 for an illustration of the ImagePRO-4K front panel.

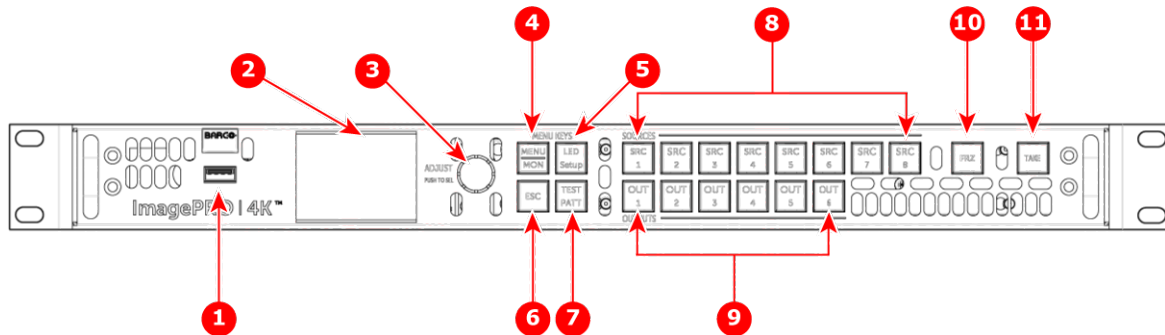


Image 4-1: Front panel

Following are descriptions of each front panel control feature:

1. USB port  
The USB port supports uploading and downloading system configurations and upgrading ImagePRO-4K firmware.
2. Display screen  
The LCD color video display shows all ImagePRO-4K menus, sub-menus, and messages. The display can be toggled between Menu mode and Monitor mode.
3. Adjust knob
  - Turn the Adjust knob to scroll up or down through the menus.
    - Turn the knob clockwise to scroll down.
    - Turn the knob counter-clockwise to scroll up.
  - Press the Adjust knob to select menu items.
4. Menu/Monitor mode toggle button  
The Menu/Monitor mode toggle button toggles the display between Menu mode and Monitor mode.
5. LED setup button  
The LED setup button accesses the Setup Menu.
6. ESC (Escape) button  
Press the ESC button to exit a menu without making changes, to cancel an operation, to answer No to menu queries, or to return to the Status Menu. Each press takes you back up the menu tree one level.
7. Test pattern button  
The Test pattern button sets up a test pattern on the selected output.
8. Source buttons: SRC 1 through SRC 8  
Source buttons 1 through 6 default to the input sources on the Tri-Combo input card; SRC 7 defaults to "Matte"; and SRC 8 defaults to "Logo." All of the source buttons can be re-mapped, and they can be mapped as Presets.
9. Output buttons: OUT 1 through OUT 6  
Output buttons 1 through 6 default to the outputs on the Tri-Combo output card. OUT 1 is mapped as Aux Channel A, OUT 2 as Aux Channel B. OUT 3 – 6 are not mapped.
10. FRZ (Freeze) button  
FRZ (FREEZE) enables you to freeze a displayed image.
11. Take button  
The Take button executes transitions in Preview mode.

## 4.2 Rear panel

### About the rear panel

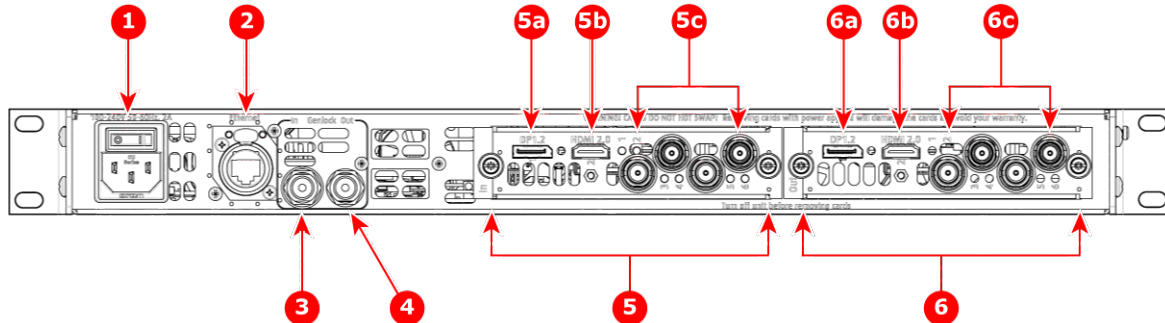


Image 4-2: Rear panel

Following are descriptions of each rear-panel control feature:

- 1. AC power**  
A single AC connector with a power switch connects the ImagePRO–4K to your facility’s AC power source through the supplied power cord. The integral switch turns the unit on and off.  
100-240 VAC, 50/60Hz, 125w
- 2. Ethernet port**  
One RJ-45 connector provides 1000/100/10 Mbps Ethernet communications with the ImagePRO–4K. Use the Ethernet port for running the Web Interface, for diagnostics, and for connection to an external device. The Ethernet connector is compatible with:
  - Standard RJ-45 Ethernet cables
  - Neutrik EtherCon® series cables
- 3. BNC: Genlock In**  
Genlock analog reference input is through a BNC connector with fixed 75 ohm termination and supports Blackburst and Bi-level at SD and supports Tri-level at HD.
- 4. BNC: Genlock Output**  
An internal sync generator, capable of Bi-level and Tri-level sync signals, provides Genlock reference output, which is capable of Bi-level and Tri-level sync signals.
- 5. Tri-Combo input card:**
  - a)** DisplayPort 1.2.
  - b)** HDMI 2.0.
  - c)** SDI 1 through SDI 4.

This card provides one 20-pin DisplayPort connector, supporting DisplayPort video signal; one 19-pin HDMI connector, supporting an HDMI video signal; and 4 BNC connectors, supporting Single Link and Quad Link signals, in SD, HD, 3G, 6G, and 12G SDI formats.

The features of this card include:

  - Up to six (6) independent signals.
  - One channel of DisplayPort video on a full-size DisplayPort connector.
  - One channel of HDMI video on a Type A connector.
  - Up to four independent SDI signals with support for SD, HD, 3G, 6G, and 12G in Single Link or Quad Link (3G).
  - An LED on each input channel that turns green when a valid sync is detected.
- 6. Tri-Combo output card:**
  - a)** DisplayPort 1.2.

- b) HDMI 2.0.
- c) SDI 1 through SDI 4.

This card provides one 20-pin DisplayPort connector, supporting DisplayPort video signal; one 19-pin HDMI connector, supporting an HDMI video signal; and 4 BNC connectors, supporting Single Link and Quad Link signals, in SD, HD, 3G, 6G, and 12G SDI formats.

## Genlock input connector

The genlock input supports NTSC and PAL Blackburst, as well as SD bi-level and HD tri-level sync signals, per SMPTE 274M and SMPTE 296M.

When the ImagePRO-4K is genlocked and the lock source is lost for some reason, the output of the unit automatically switches to a “coasting” state without any discernible “glitching” on the output display device. The user interface still indicates that the genlock source is “Lock to External.” The system does not, however, automatically relock to the external source. The user must reselect **Lock to External**. This prevents constant glitching of the outputs if the genlock source is not stable.

Once the genlock source is restored, the user can then re-select **Lock to External** to re-lock to the external source.



Selecting **Lock to External** may cause the outputs to temporarily glitch, while the system is synchronizing to the new source. If the genlock source has been permanently removed, it is advisable to manually switch the system to **Freerun** to ensure a stable output. Any time genlock settings are changed, there is a chance of a momentary glitch to the outputs.

## 5.1 Rear-panel connections



Refer to “Rear panel”, page 23 for the location of the power, input, and output connections and for the location of the power switch.

### Rear panel

1. **Connect power**—Ensure that power is properly connected to the ImagePRO–4K video processor.
2. **Connect inputs**—Connect all input sources to the ImagePRO–4K.
3. **Connect outputs**—Connect the output(s) on the ImagePRO–4K to your projector(s) or other target devices.
4. **Turn on power**—Turn on power to the ImagePRO–4K, your connected display devices, and to all peripheral equipment.

## 5.2 Front-panel operation

### Front-panel features

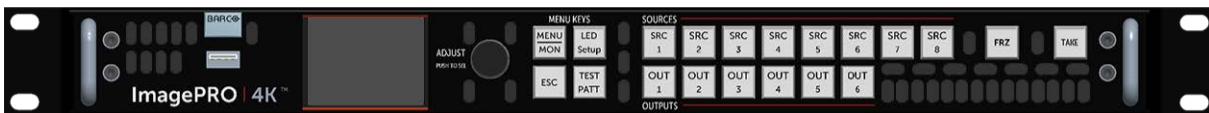


Image 5-1: ImagePRO–4K front panel

### Display screen

The display screen is a 45 mm by 35 mm LED screen that displays the status of the system and the menus and submenus of the system. The display screen can also monitor the input to or the output from the system.

At power-up, the display screen displays the status of the system.

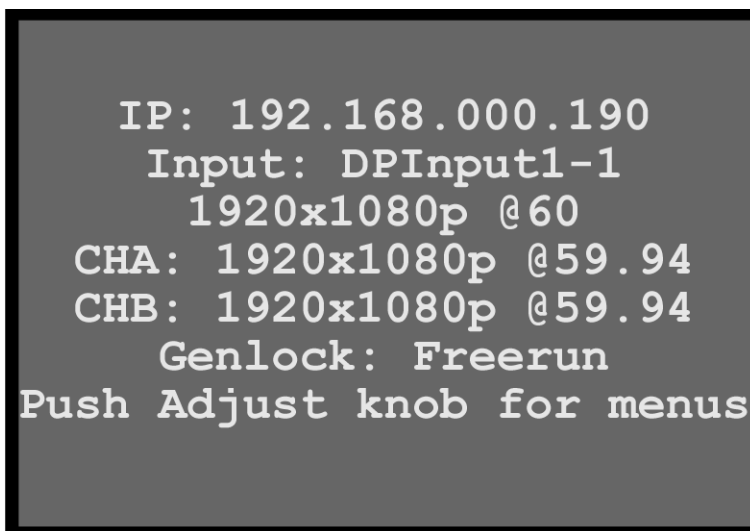


Image 5-2: Display screen showing status

Push the Adjust knob to enter the Setup menu.

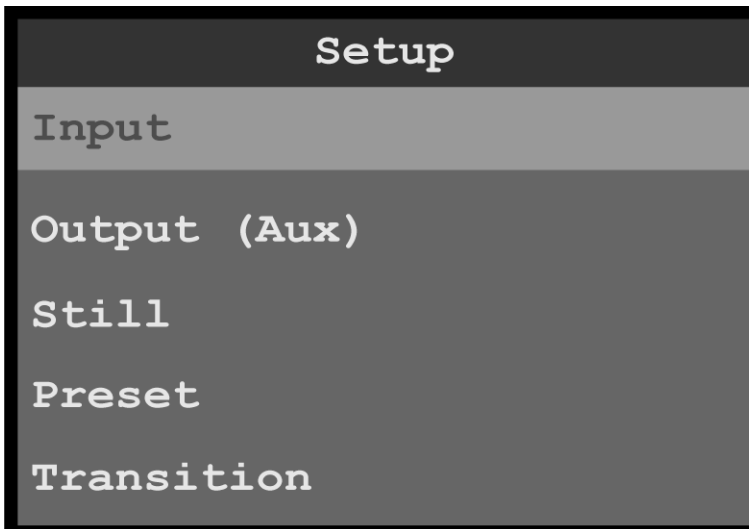


Image 5-3: Display screen showing Setup menu

Push the **MENU/MON** menu key to toggle the display screen between menu mode and monitor mode.

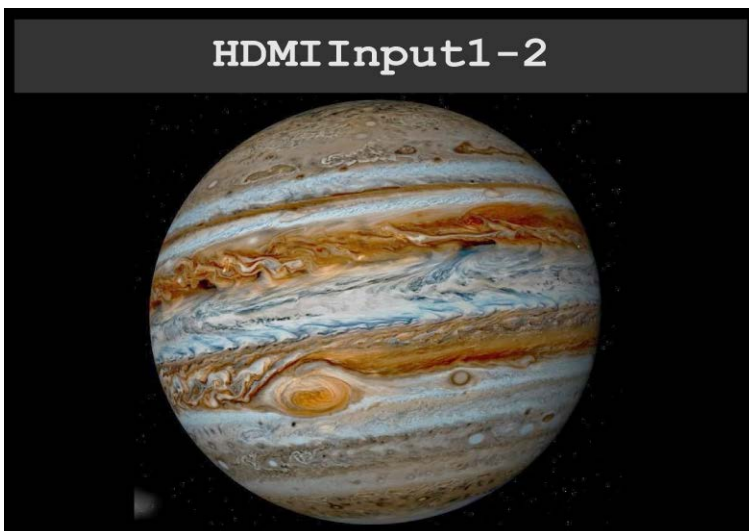


Image 5-4: Display screen monitoring HDMI input

## Display screen controls

The display-screen controls include the adjust knob and the menu keys: **MENU/MON**, **LED Setup**, **ESC**, and **TEST PATT**.



### Adjust knob

1. Press the Adjust knob to enter the Setup menu.
2. Turn the Adjust knob to scroll up or down through the menus.
  - Turn the knob clockwise to scroll down.
  - Turn the knob counter-clockwise to scroll up.
3. Press the Adjust knob to select menu items.



### MENU/MON key

1. Press the **MENU/MON** menu key to toggle between menu mode, in which the display screen shows the menus, and monitor mode, in which the display monitors either input or output. The system has two types of monitor: it can monitor the output, or it can monitor the input. If an output button is amber, the system is monitoring that output. If the output buttons are green, the system is monitoring **input**.



### LED Setup key

1. Press the **LED Setup** menu key to enter the LED Setup.
2. Scroll through the LED Setup menu to select the Aux channel, the wall sizing, and the image sizing.
3. Select **Save All** to save your settings.



### TEST PATT key

1. Press the **TEST PATT** menu key to enter the Test Pattern menu.
2. Scroll through the Test Pattern menu to select the Aux channel and the type of test pattern and to set the AOI Raster Box, the Output Raster Box, and the Diagonal Motion on or off. The test-pattern types are:
  - Off
  - Horizontal Ramp
  - Vertical Ramp
  - 100% Color Bars
  - 16x16 Grid
  - 32x32 Grid
  - Burst
  - 75% Color Bars
  - 50% Gray
  - Horizontal Steps
  - Vertical Steps
  - White
  - Black
  - SMPTE Bars
  - H Alignment
  - V Alignment
  - HV Alignment
  - Circle Alignment
  - Red
  - Green
  - Blue

- **SMPTE Bars** can be used to determine if the signal chain has a full or reduced range.
- **Circle Alignment** can be used to determine if the signal chain is horizontally or vertically scaled. The horizontal and vertical grid spacing, grid color, grid orientation, and grid width can all be adjusted.

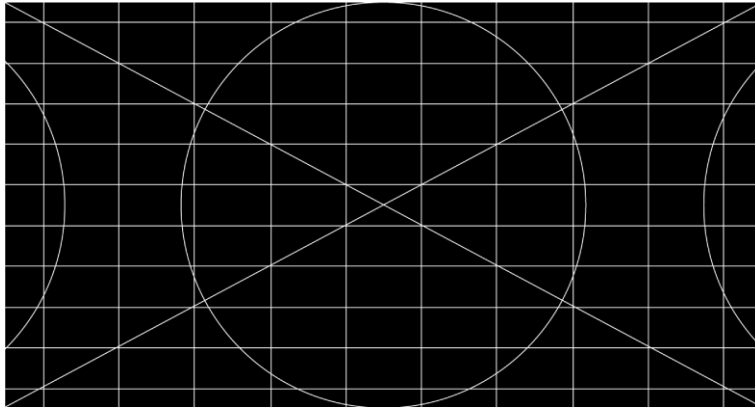


Image 5-5: Circle Alignment test pattern

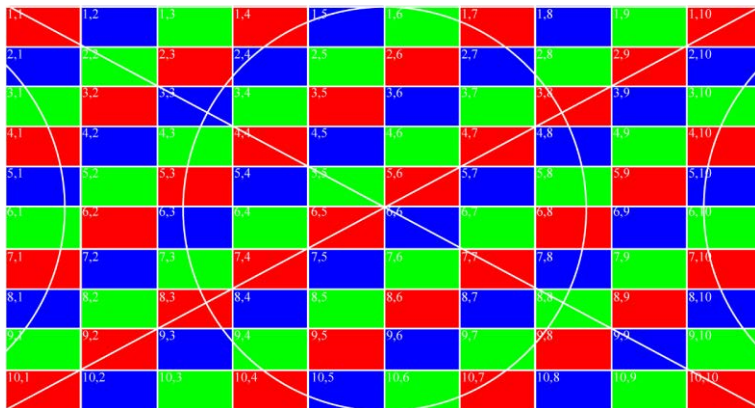


Image 5-6: Circle Alignment test pattern in LED mode



#### ESC key

1. Press the **ESC** (escape) menu key to deactivate a selection, to move back one level in a menu, or to exit a menu.



Press the **Adjust knob** to enter the Setup menu.

1. **Factory reset**—If you are using the ImagePRO–4K for the first time, or if you are using an ImagePRO–4K that has just returned from another event, perform a full factory reset to restore default system configurations.  
Press the Adjust knob to enter the Setup menu, then select **Reset / Factory** on the display screen. **Reset / Soft Reset** keeps the user settings.
2. **Native Rate**—On the front panel, press the Adjust knob to enter the Setup menu, then select Setup / System menu and select the desired Native Rate.  
The Native Rate should be set to the frame rate in frames per second of the main output.
3. **Assign primary output**—If the primary output is DP, proceed to the next step.  
If your primary output is HDMI/SDI, go to **Setup / Output (AUX) / Primary Output** and update the primary output.
4. **Adjust output format**—Go to **Setup / Output (AUX) / Aux Adjustment** and update the output format.
5. **Test output**—Turn on a test pattern, verify that you have an image, and make any necessary adjustments. When complete, turn off the test pattern.
6. **Position and adjust the image**—Use the LED Setup Menu to position the image on the LED wall or other display device, scale the image, adjust **Pan** and **Zoom** settings, and save your view.

**Note:** The preceding step provides a reliable shortcut when your setup does not require complex adjustments. Use this step instead of or in conjunction with steps 7 through 9.

7. **Set and adjust inputs / sources**— Select inputs / sources and make any necessary adjustments to color balance, timings, and any other settings necessary.
8. **Save input / source configurations**— After adjusting an input / source, save the input /source configuration.  
Repeat steps 7 and 8 for each input / source.
9. **Adjust and save system settings**—Adjust system parameters such as Ethernet settings and HDCP parameters.
10. **Save All** — Select **Save All**.  
Save All is the last menu item on the Setup page. Save All writes system settings to non-volatile memory.

## 5.3 Factory reset

### Perform a factory reset

If you are using the ImagePRO–4K for the first time, or if you are using an ImagePRO–4K that has just returned from an event, perform a full factory reset (**Reset / Factory**) to restore default system configurations.

1. Press the Adjust knob to enter the Setup menu.
2. Turn the adjust knob to scroll to **Reset**.

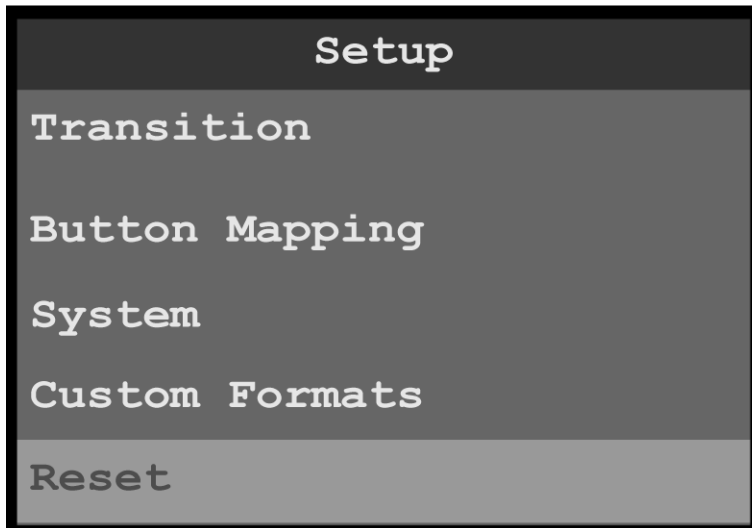


Image 5-7: Setup menu: Reset

## 6.1 Power-up initialization

### How to power up the ImagePRO-4K

Connect power to the ImagePRO-4K, then locate the power switch on the rear panel and turn power **On**. While the system is initializing, the front-panel buttons light up, and the Barco logo and the following messages are displayed.



Image 6-1: Barco logo screen

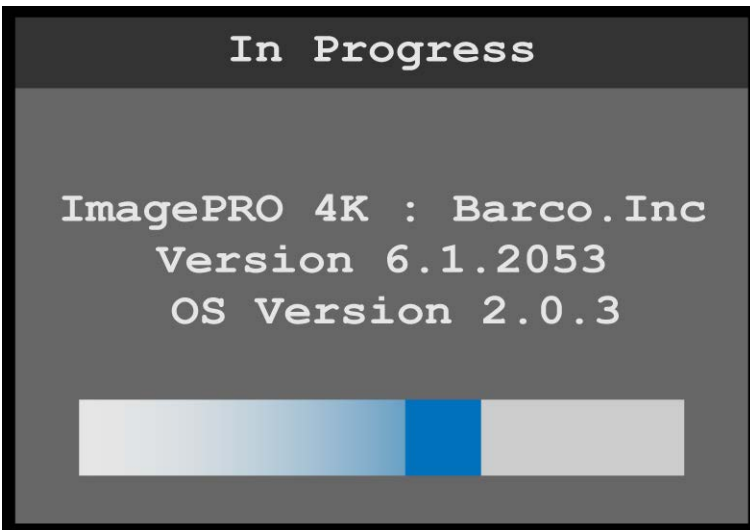


Image 6-2: System initialization "In Progress"

Image 6-4: Menu tree

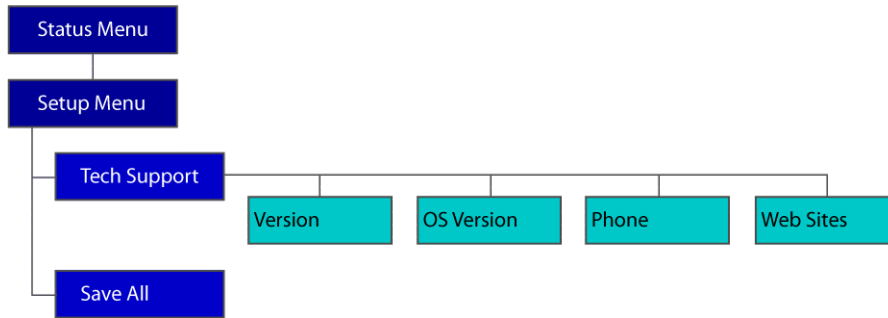


Image 6-5: Menu tree (Continued)

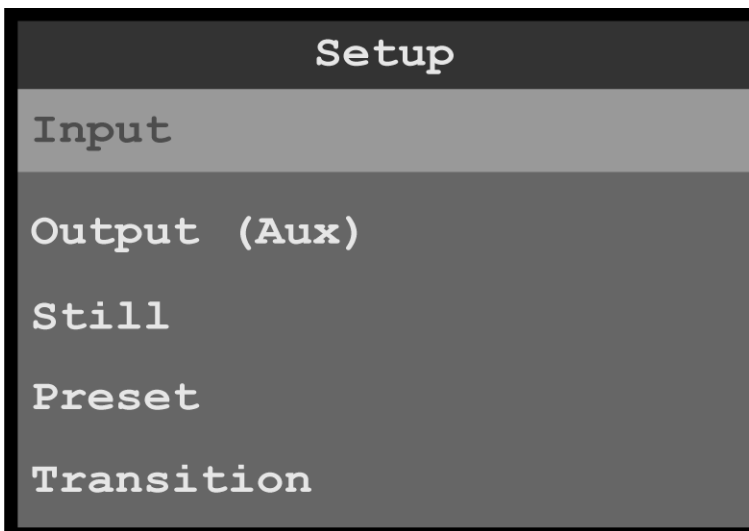


Image 6-6: Setup menu: Input

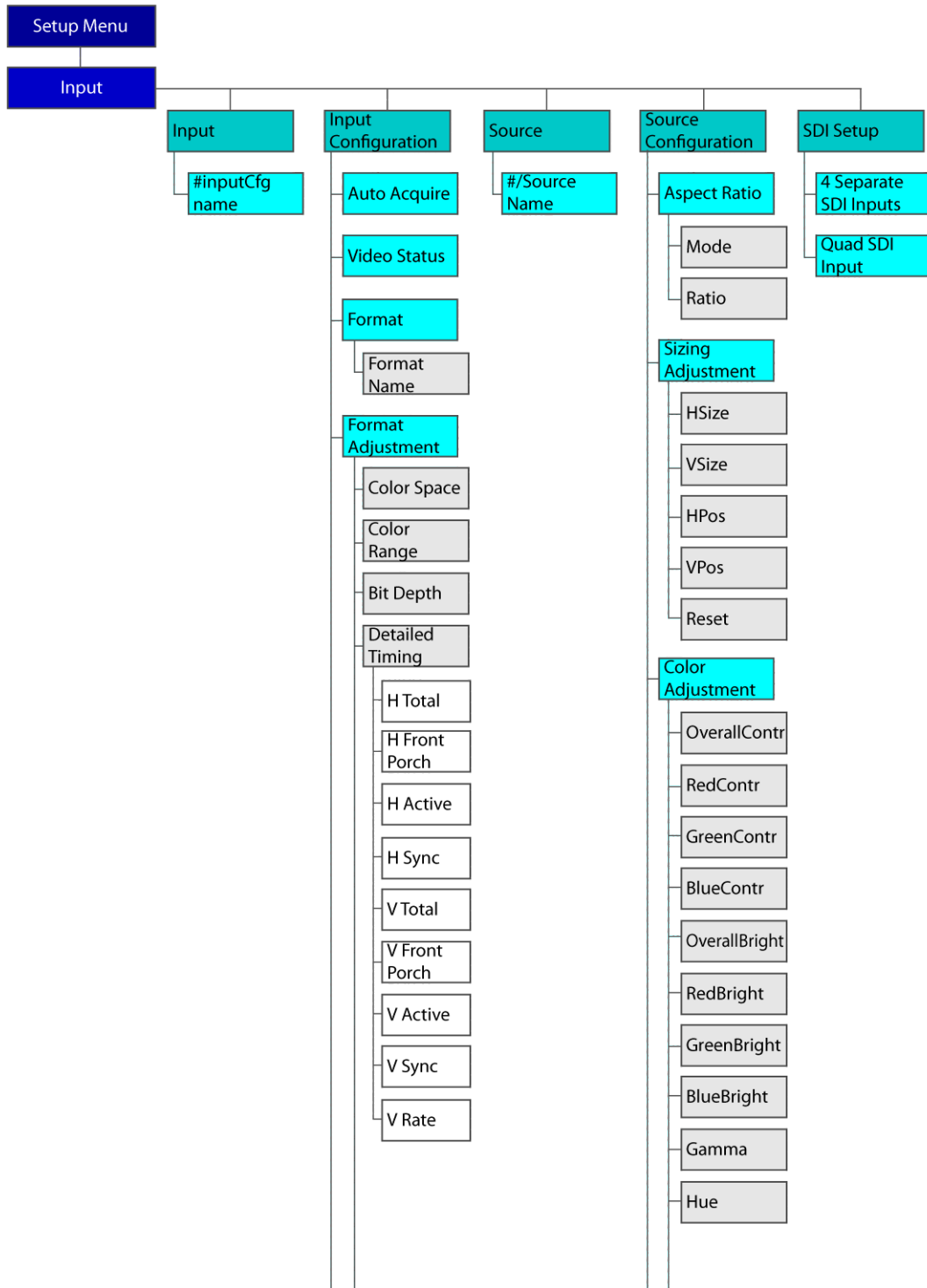


Image 6-7: Input menu tree

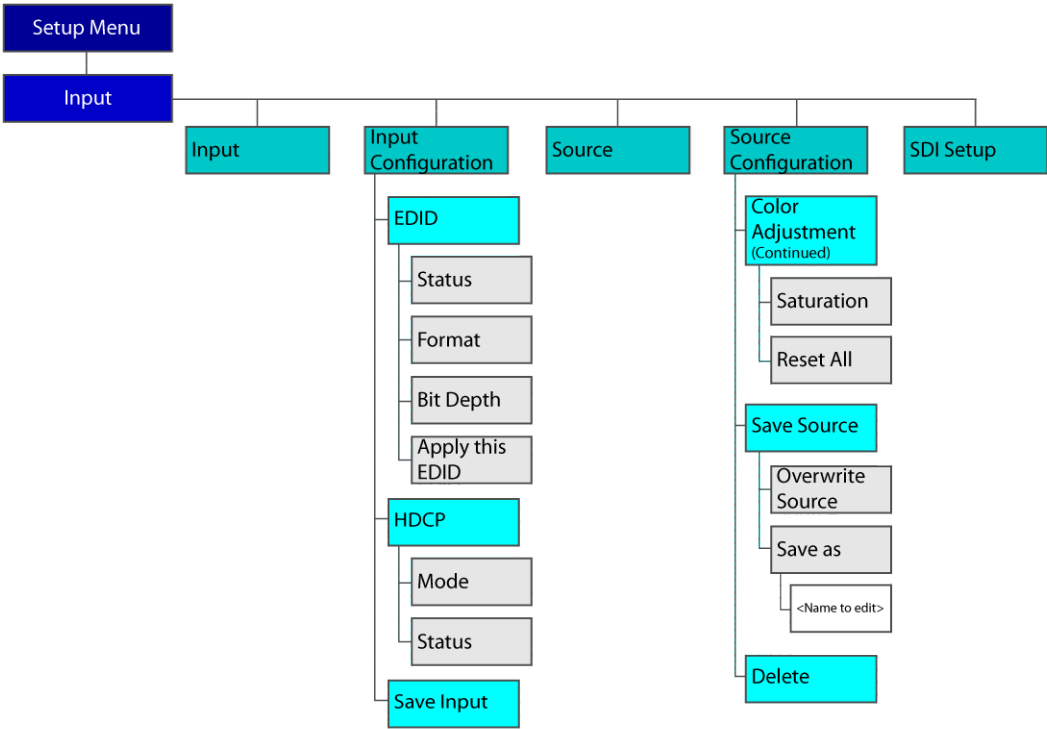


Image 6-8: Input menu tree (Continued)

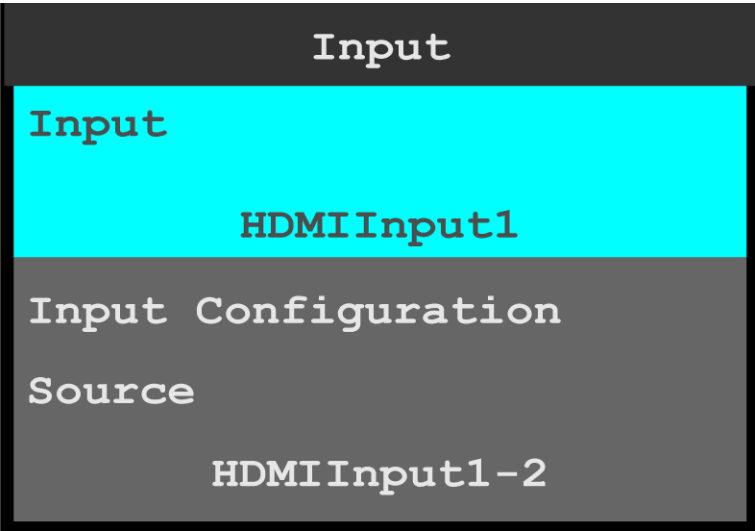


Image 6-9: Input selection

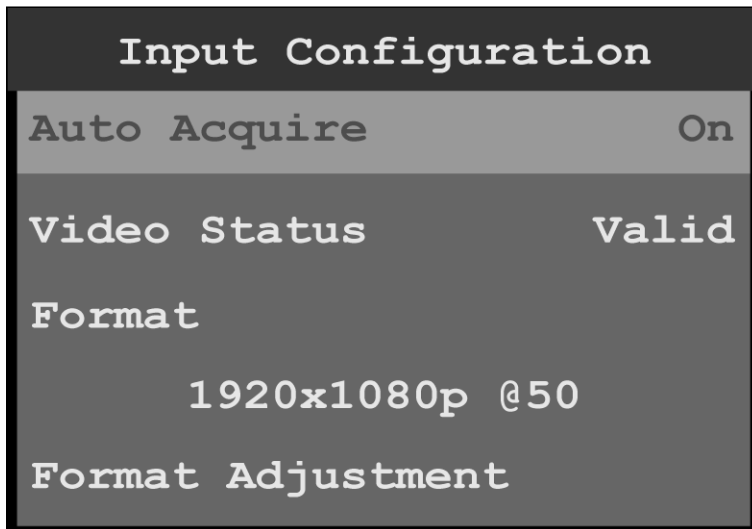


Image 6-10: Input configuration

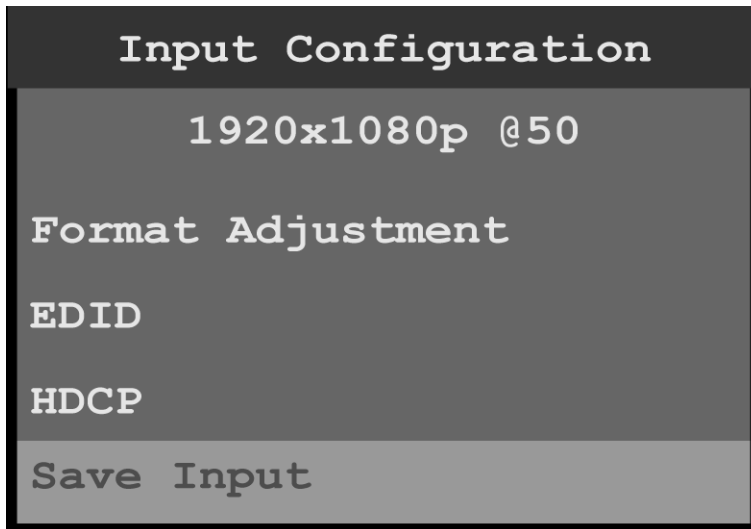


Image 6-11: Input configuration (Continued)

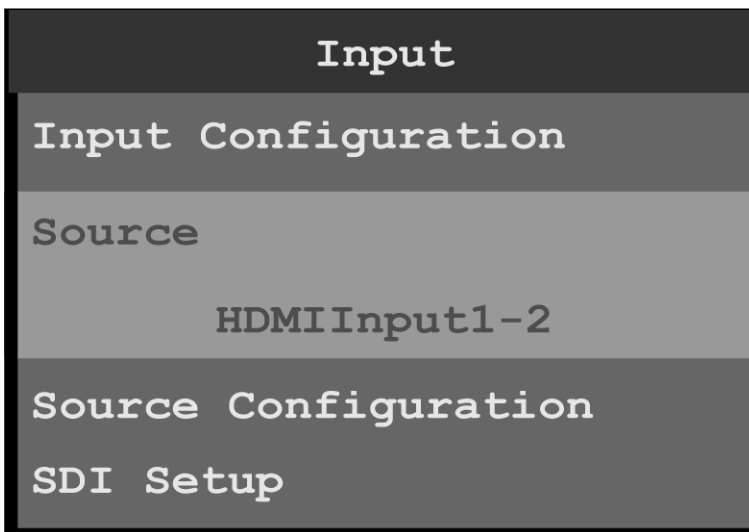


Image 6-12: Input Source

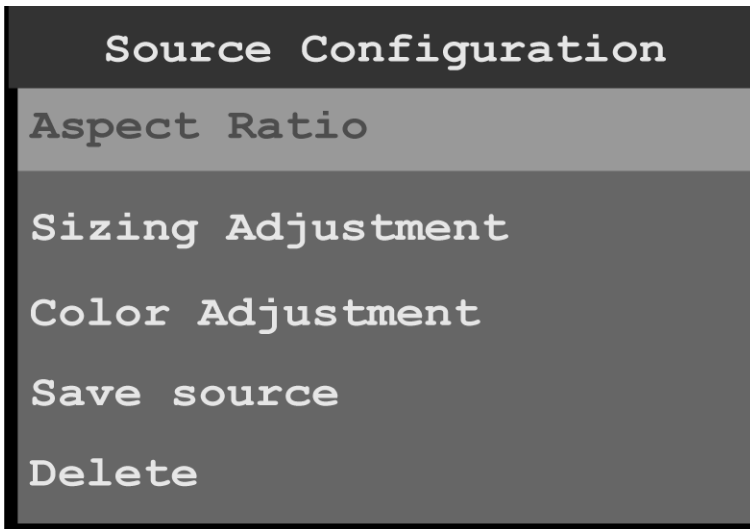


Image 6-13: Source Configuration menu

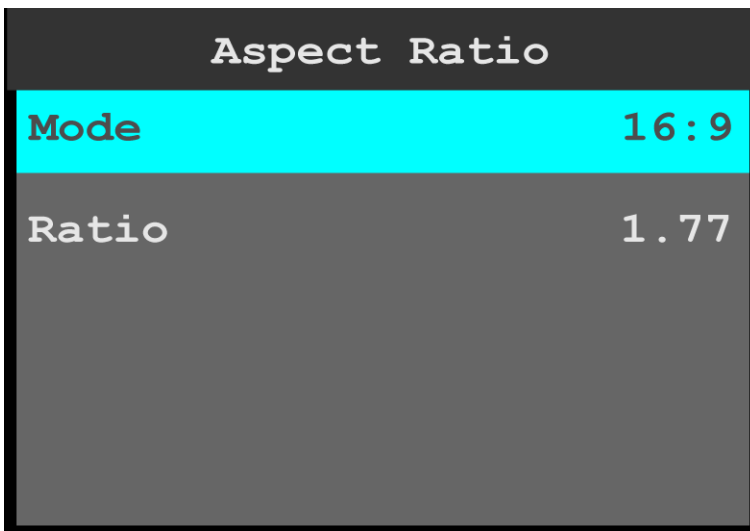


Image 6-14: Source Configuration: Aspect Ratio

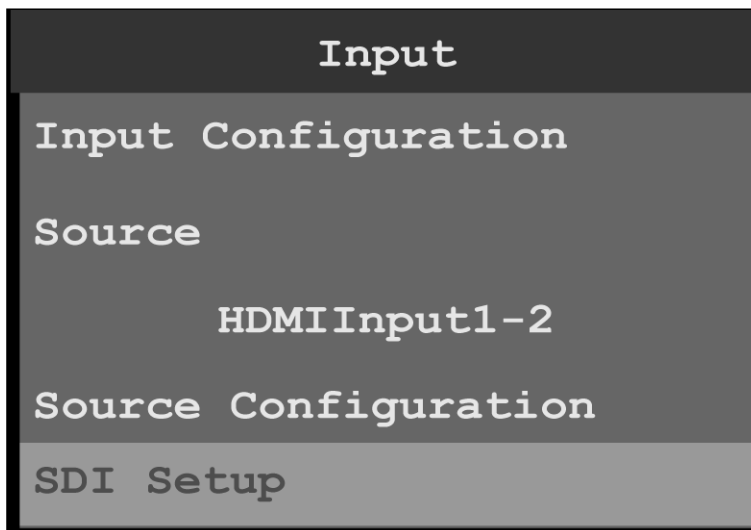


Image 6-15: Input menu: SDI Setup

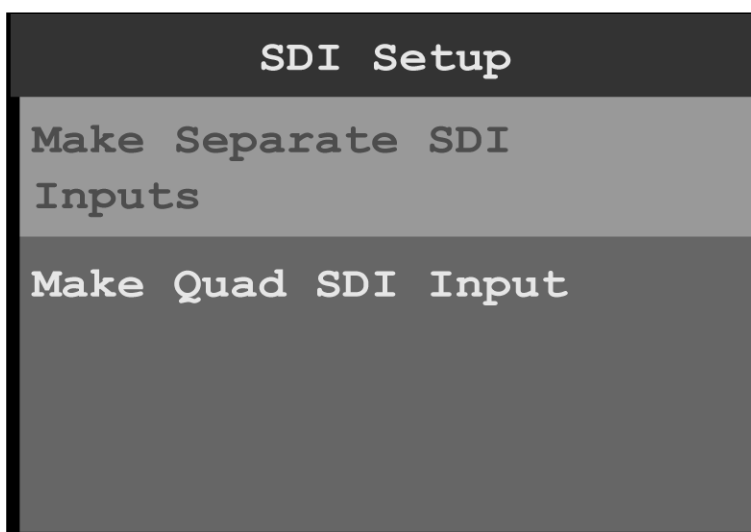


Image 6-16: SDI Setup

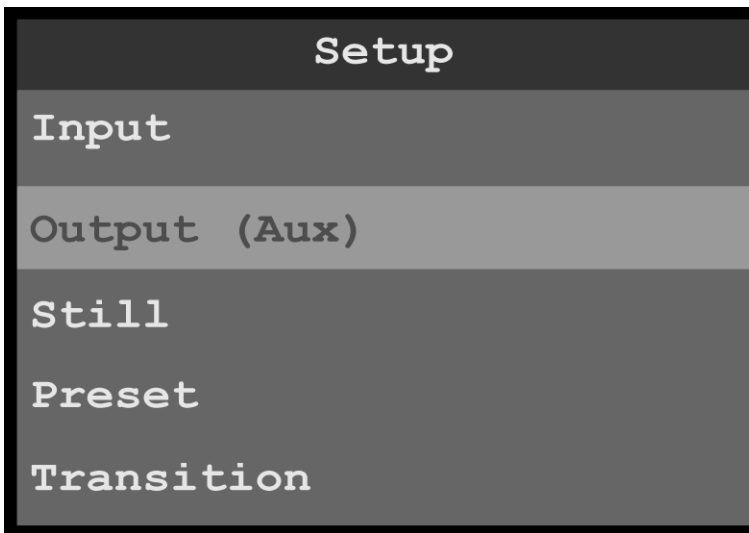


Image 6-17: Setup menu: Output (Aux)

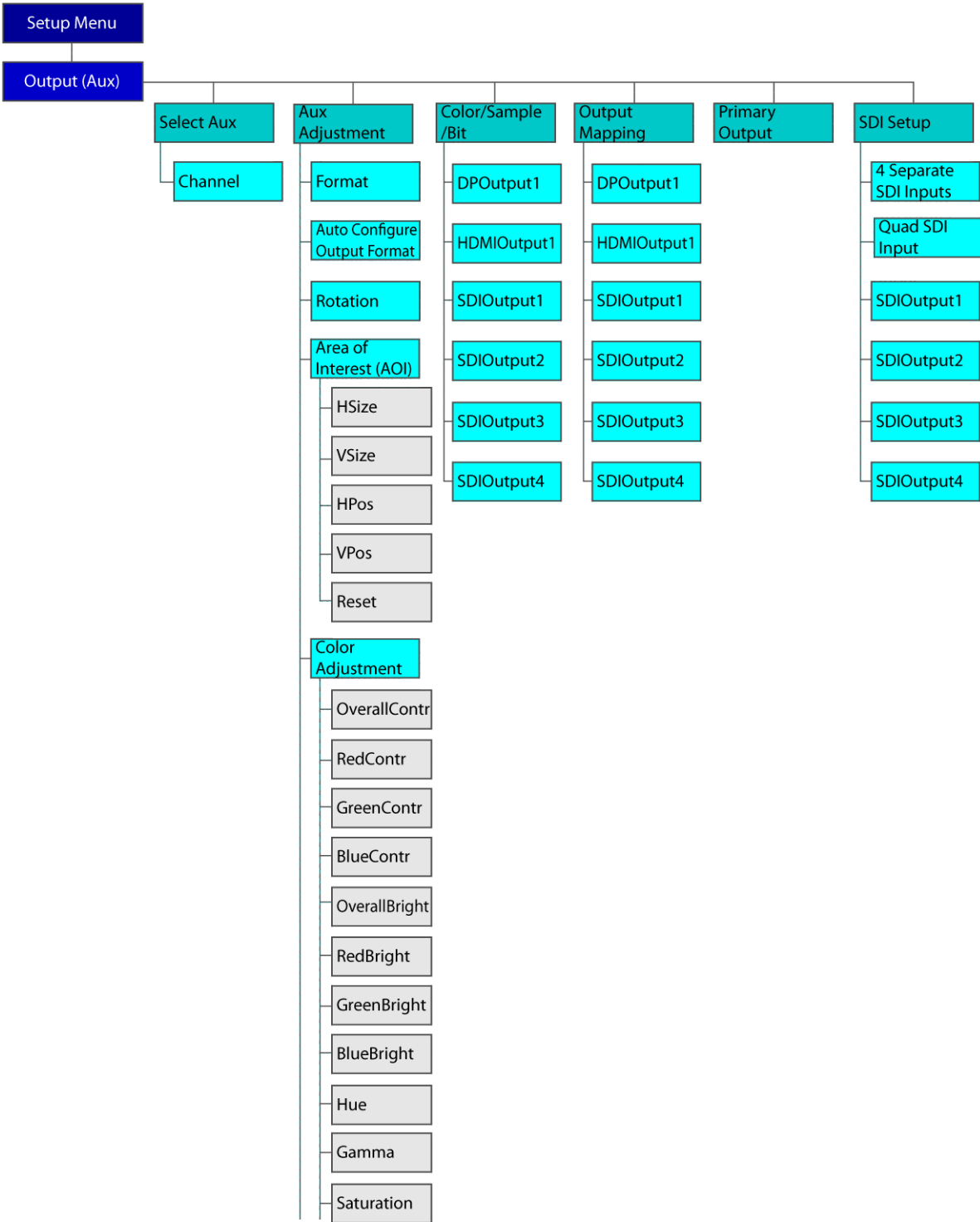


Image 6-18: Output (Aux) menu tree

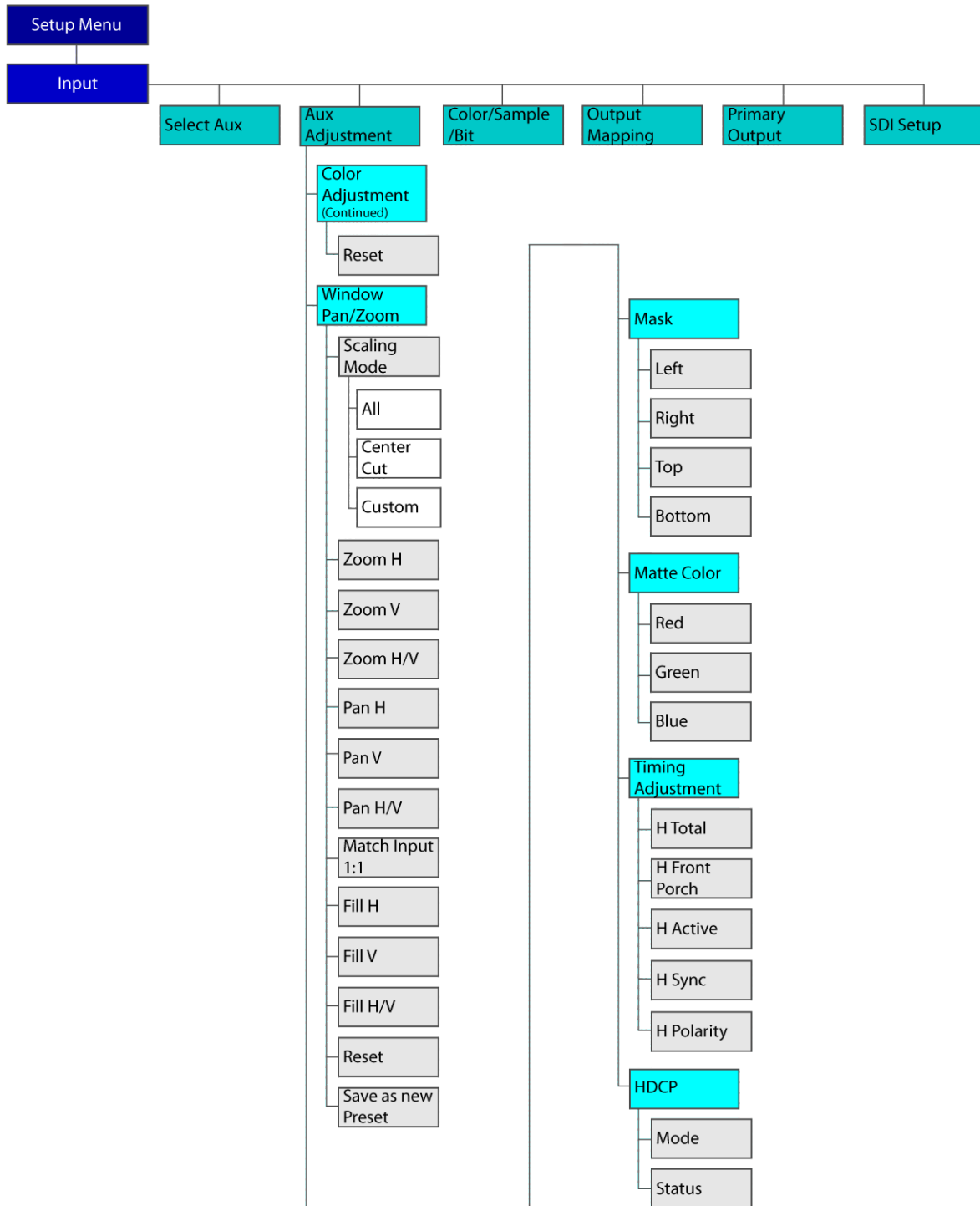


Image 6-19: Output (Aux) menu tree (Continued)

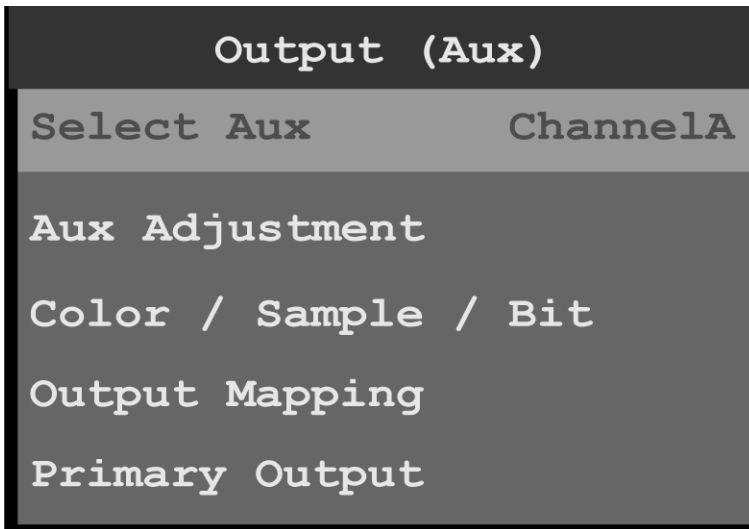


Image 6-20: Output (Aux): Select Aux

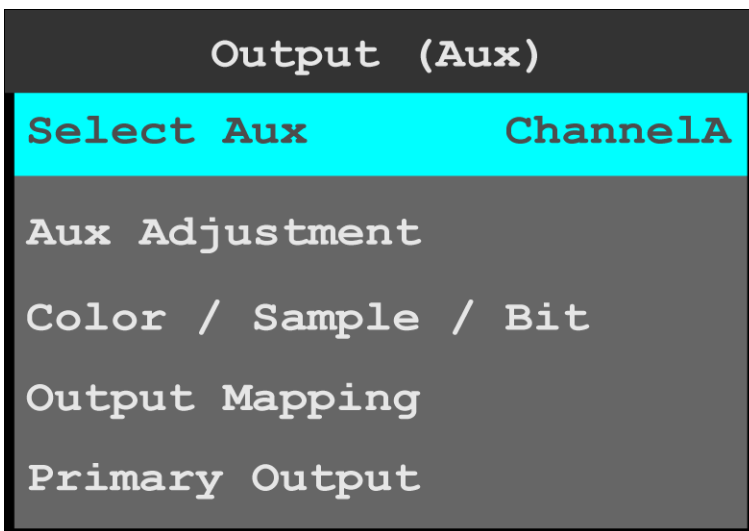


Image 6-21: Output (Aux): channel selection

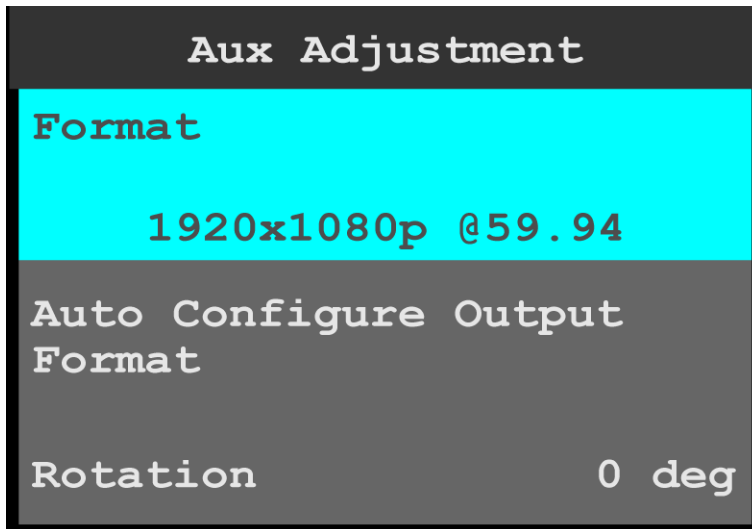


Image 6-22: Aux Adjustment: Format

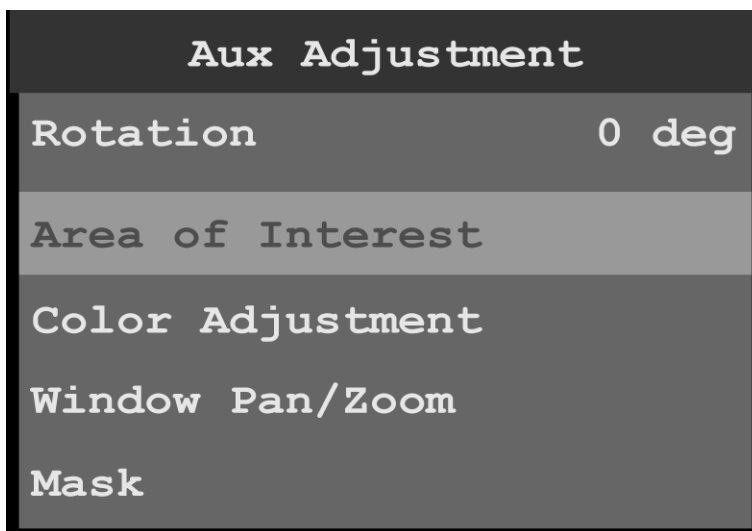


Image 6-23: Aux Adjustment: Area of Interest

- Gamma – Range: 0.30 to 3.30; Default: 1.00
  - Saturation – Range: 0 to 150; Default: 100
  - Reset returns the color adjustments to their initial settings.
7. Scroll to and select **Window Pan/Zoom** to view or adjust panning and zooming options. **Scaling Mode** can be set to **All**, **Center Cut**, or **Custom**. For custom configurations, other adjustments can be made.
- **Zoom H** zooms in or out on the horizontal center of the image. Increasing this setting “stretches” the image to the right and left along the horizontal plane. Decreasing this setting brings the right and left edges in toward the center of the active area.
  - **Zoom V** zooms in or out on the vertical center of the image. Increasing this setting “stretches” the image up and down along the vertical plane. Decreasing this setting brings the top and bottom edges in toward the center of the active area.
  - **Zoom H/V** adjusts both horizontal and vertical zoom settings at the same time.
  - **Pan H** moves the image to the left or right. You can adjust Pan settings only after adjusting Zoom settings.
  - **Pan V** moves the image up or down. You can adjust Pan settings only after adjusting Zoom settings.
  - **Match Input 1:1** fills the AOI with the unscaled input image. If you created an Area of Interest that is smaller than the default active area for the input, a portion of the image is not displayed. You can then use the Pan settings to display the portion of the image you want to show.
  - **Match Program** matches the selected view in PVW to its corresponding layer in PGM.
  - **Reset** restores the default settings.
8. Scroll to and select **Mask** to view or adjust masking options. **Scaling Mode** can be set to **All**, **Center Cut**, or **Custom**. For custom configurations, other adjustments can be made. Custom Mask values are given in percentages, and range from 0% to 100%. The default mask value is 0%.
- **Left** masks the left edge of an image.
  - **Right** masks the right edge of an image.
  - **Top** masks the top of an image.
  - **Bottom** masks the bottom of an image.
  - **Reset** restores the default settings.
9. Scroll to and select **Matte Color** to view or adjust the matte-color options.
- Red – Range: 0 to 1023; default is 0.
  - Green – Range: 0 to 1023; default is 0.
  - Blue – Range: 0 to 1023; default is 0.
10. Scroll to and select **Timing Adjustment** to view and adjust the output timing options. Note that users should be familiar with how the adjustments they are making may affect the video format. The user should use a timing calculator to determine the correct numbers for timing. Incorrect settings can cause unstable or asynchronous video output.
- **H Total:** Total pixel count per line.
  - **H Front Porch:** The offset between the end of the active area and the beginning of H sync.
  - **H Active:** The horizontal size in pixels of the active area.
  - **H Sync:** H sync width in pixels.

  - **Save as Custom Format** saves the custom format, which can now be chosen from the **Aux Adjustment > Format** menu.
11. Scroll to and select **HDCP** to set up and apply HDCP settings for the input. The default HDCP mode setting for DisplayPort, DVI, and HDMI is **Off**. HDCP Mode is not applicable to SDI inputs.

## Color/Sample/Bit

1. Scroll to and select **Color / Sample / Bit** to view and adjust the color space (RGB or YCbCr), sampling rate (4:4:4), and bit depth (8, 10, or 12) of the output (Aux) signal.  
The Color / Sample / Bit menu allows users to view and adjust the color space, sampling rate, and bit depth of the output (Aux) signal.

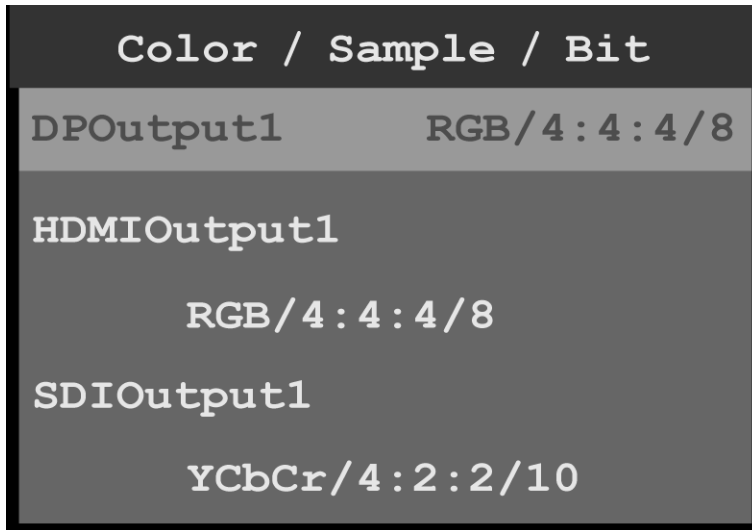


Image 6-24: Output (Aux): Color / Sample / Bit

2. Scroll to and select **DPOutput1**.  
Once the output is selected, the highlight bar turns from gray to cyan.
3. Turn the adjust knob to scroll through the possible color space, sampling rate, and bit depth settings for the selected output.
4. Press the adjust knob to select the desired color space, sampling rate, and bit depth settings for the selected output.

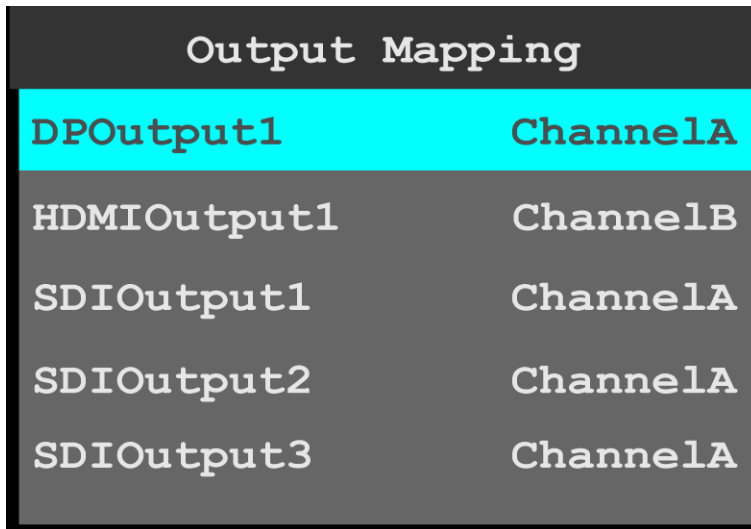


Image 6-25: Output (Aux): Output Mapping

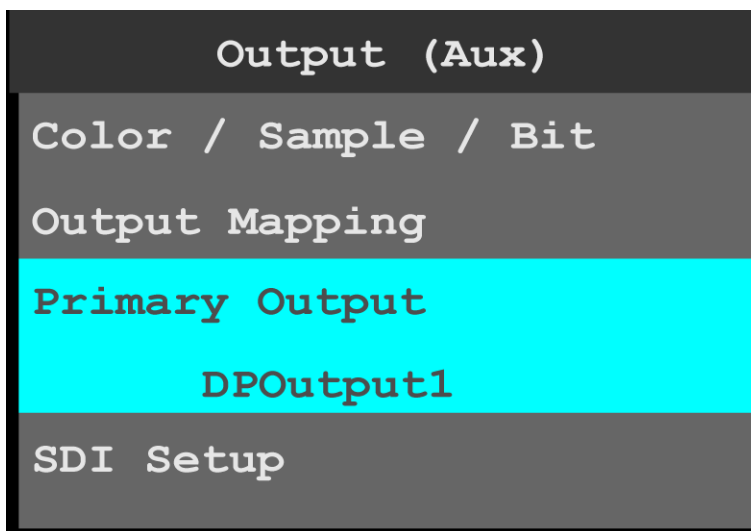


Image 6-26: Output (Aux): Primary Output

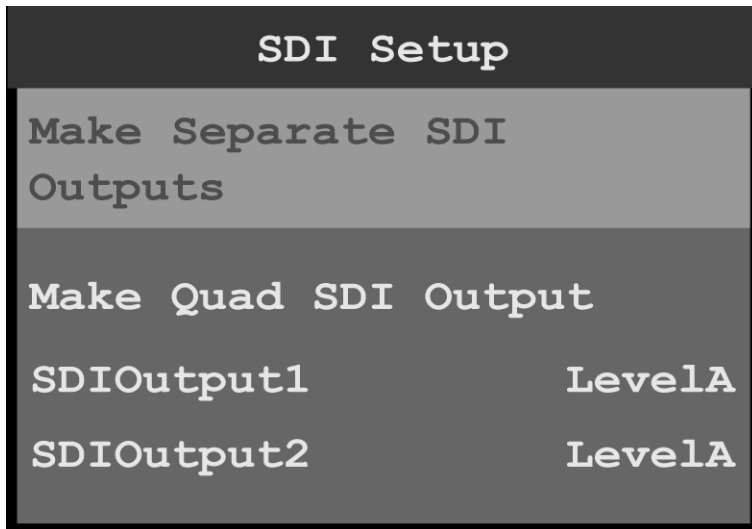


Image 6-27: SDI Setup: separate SDI outputs

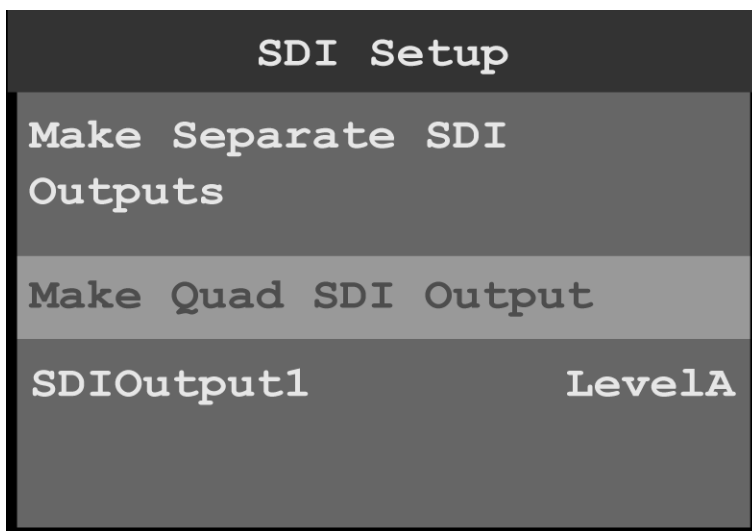


Image 6-28: SDI Setup: quad SDI output

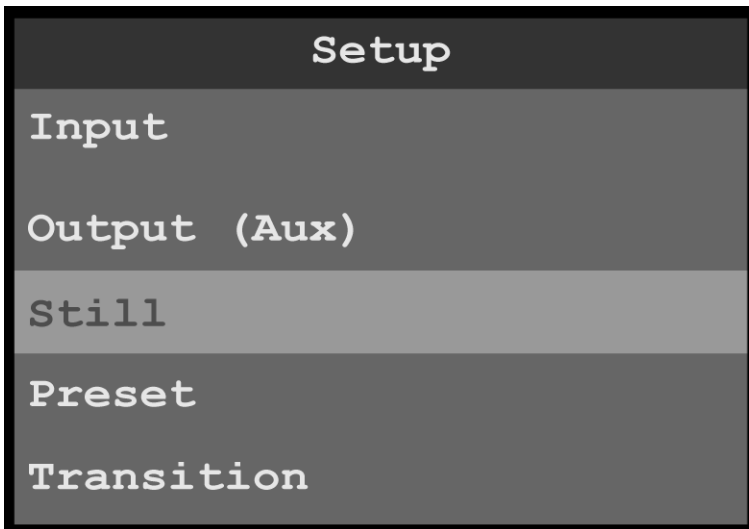


Image 6-29: Setup menu: Still

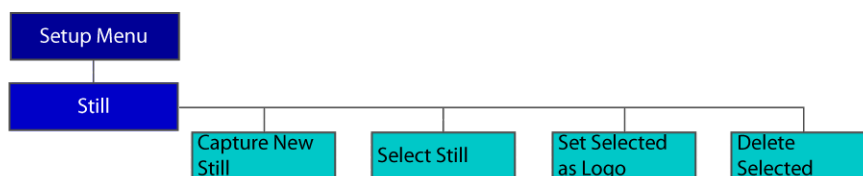


Image 6-30: Still menu tree

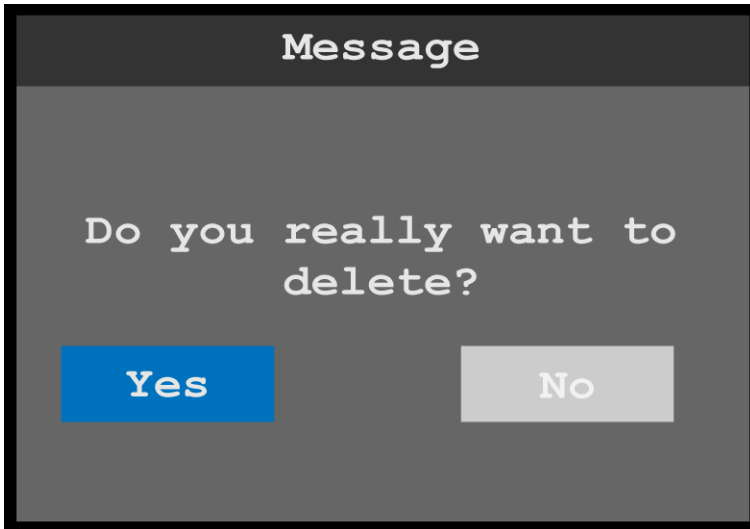


Image 6-36: Still menu: Delete message

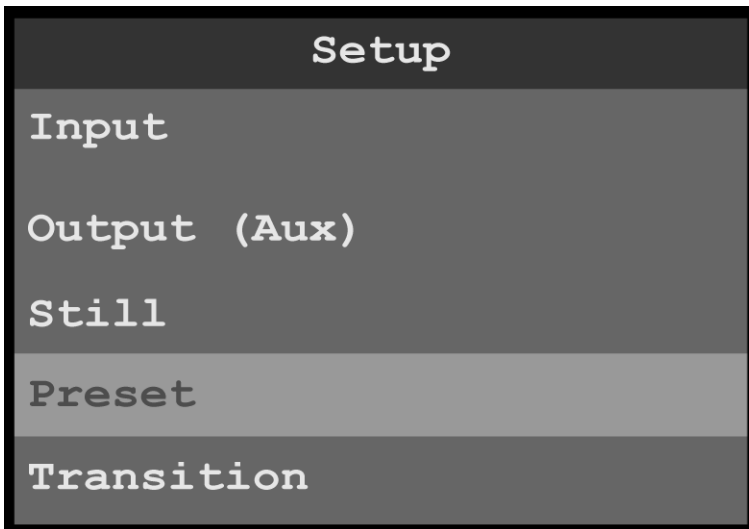


Image 6-38: Setup menu: Preset

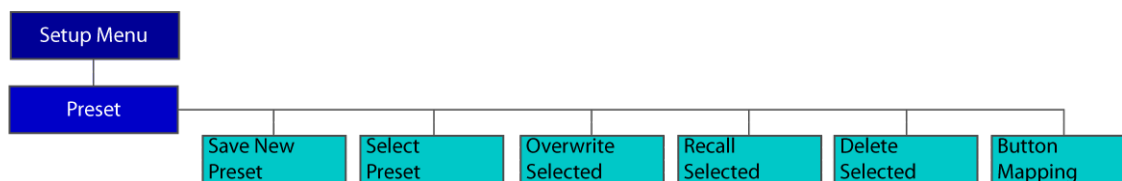


Image 6-39: Preset menu tree

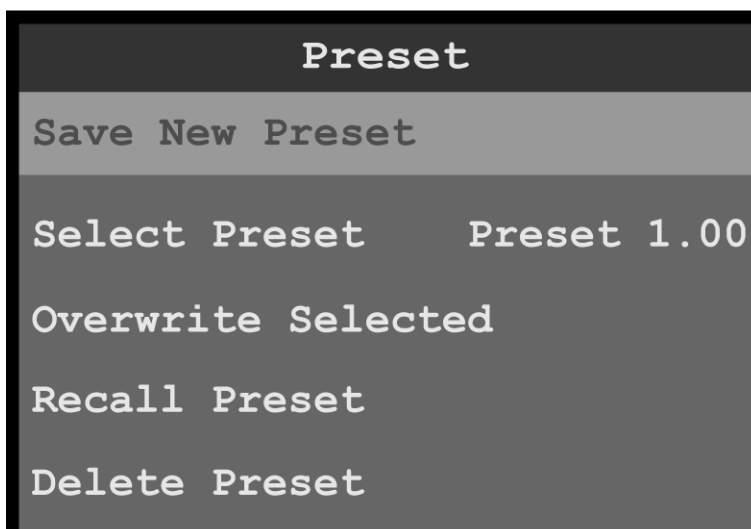


Image 6-40: Preset: Save New Preset

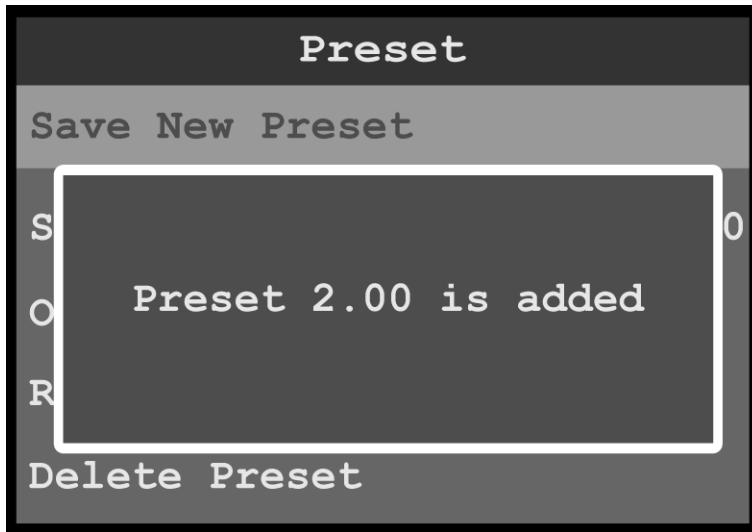


Image 6-41: Preset saved message

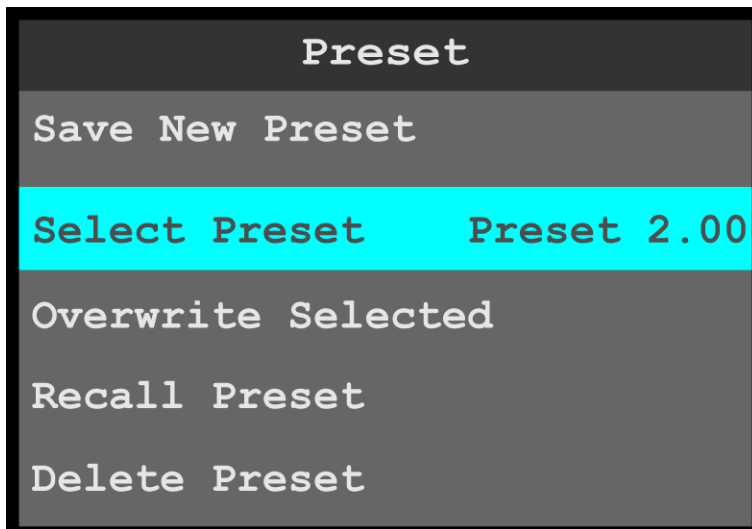


Image 6-42: Preset: Select Preset

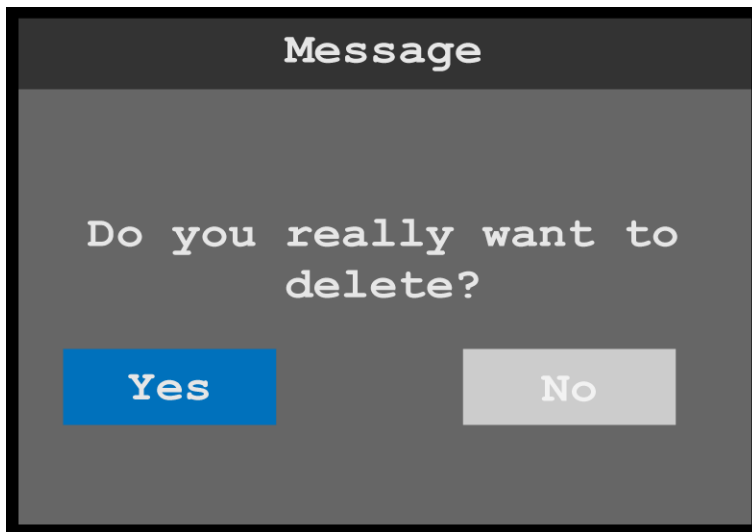


Image 6-43: Preset menu: Delete message

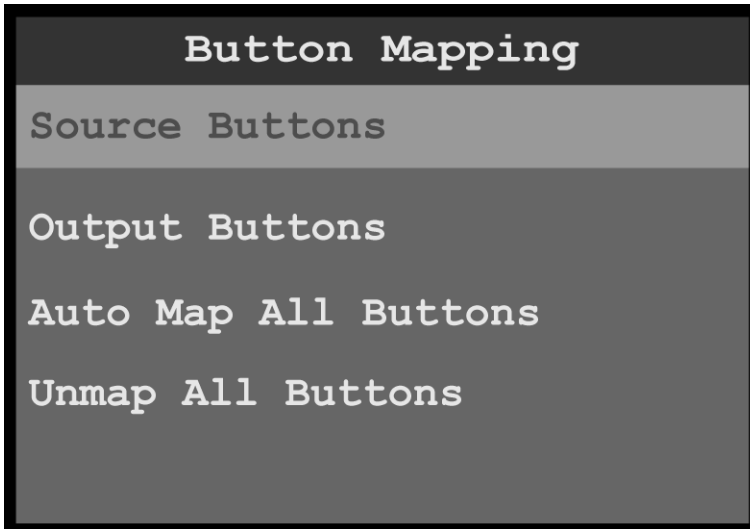


Image 6-45: Preset menu: Button Mapping

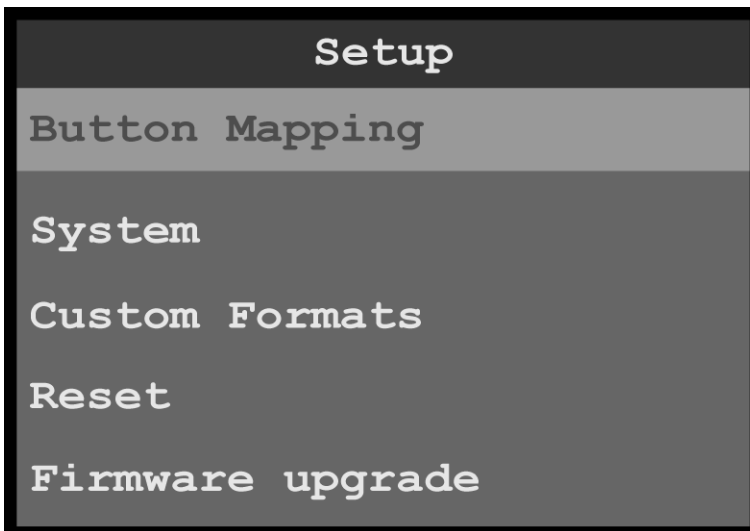


Image 6-46: Setup menu: Button Mapping

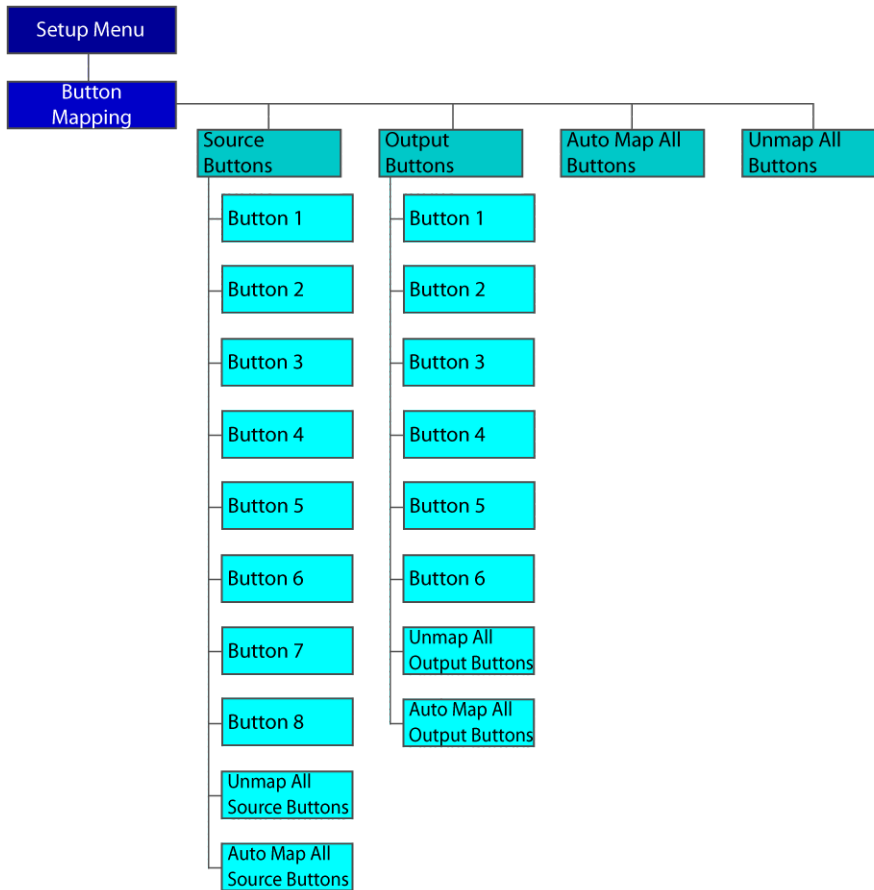


Image 6-47: Button Mapping menu tree

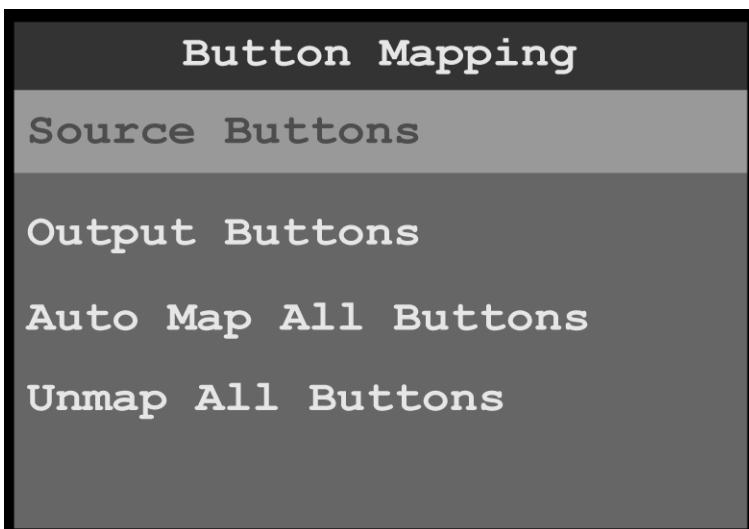


Image 6-48: Button Mapping menu: Source Buttons

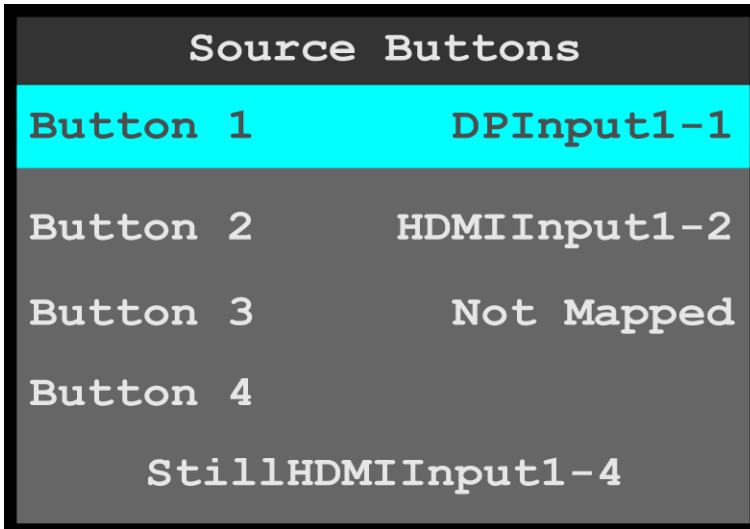


Image 6-49: Source Buttons menu

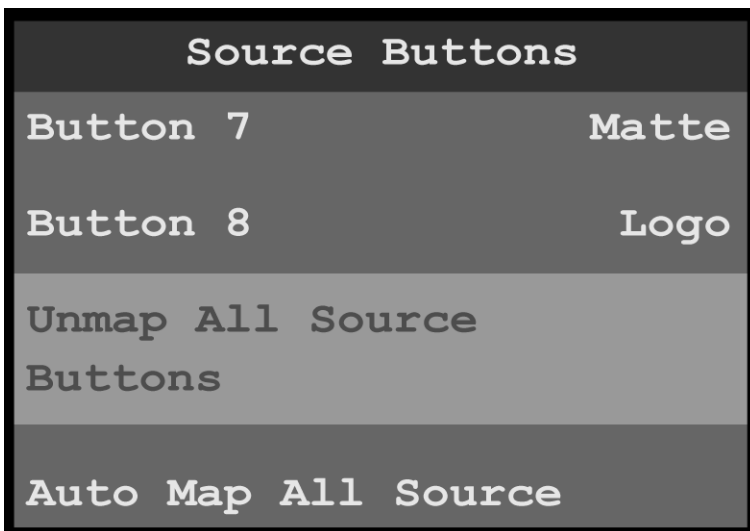


Image 6-50: Unmap All Source Buttons

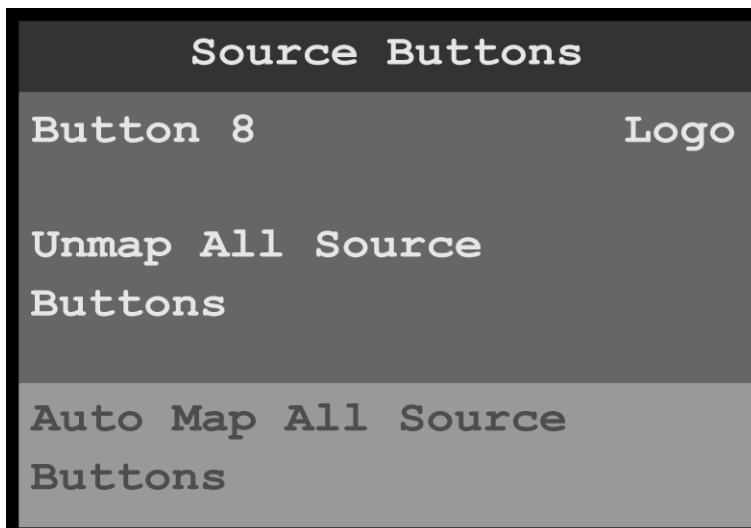


Image 6-51: Auto Map All Source Buttons

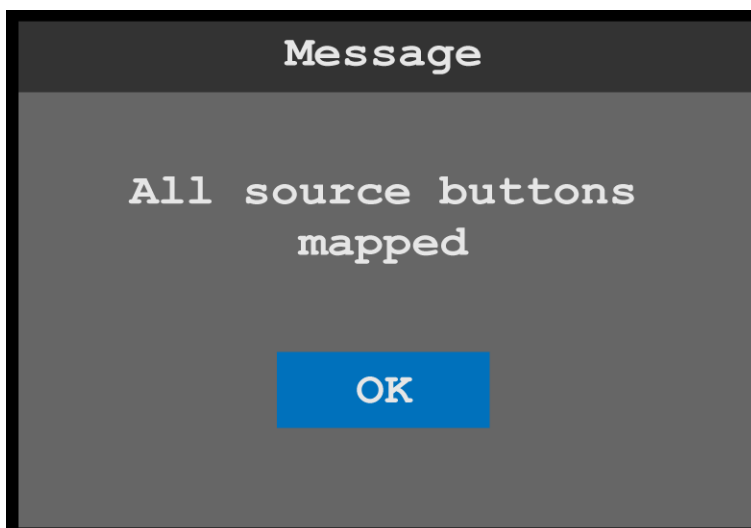


Image 6-52: All source buttons mapped message

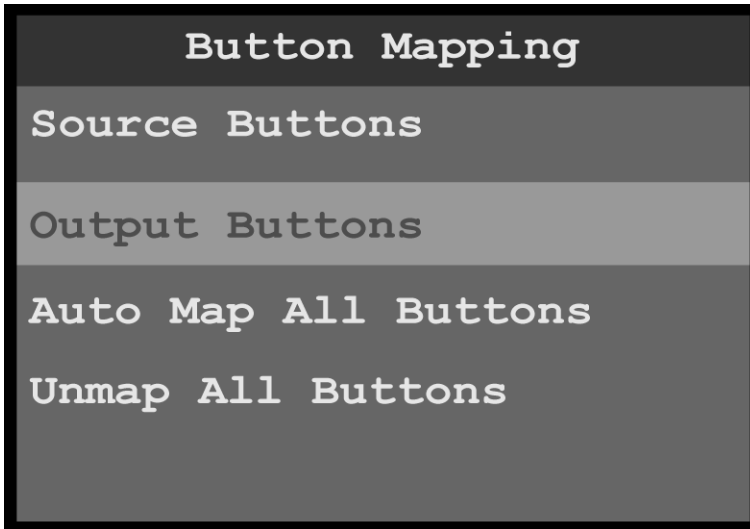


Image 6-53: Button Mapping menu: Output Buttons

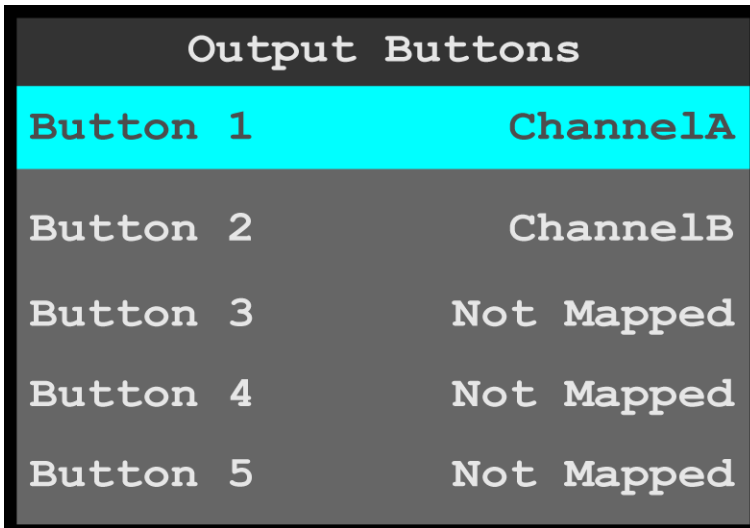


Image 6-54: Output Buttons menu

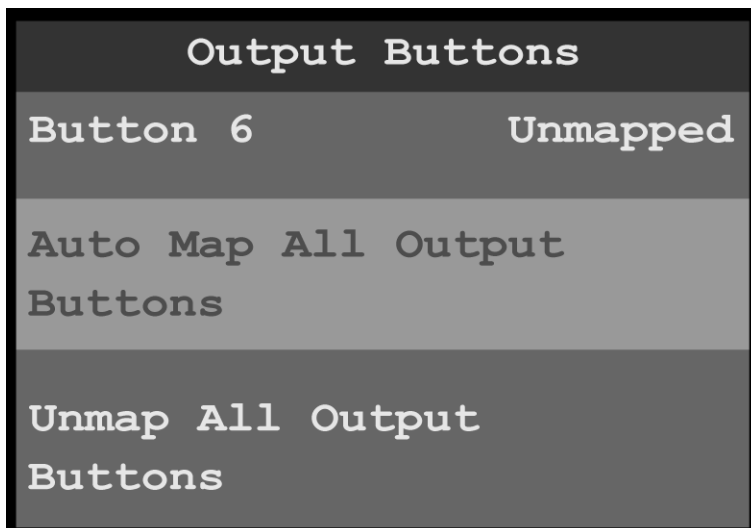


Image 6-55: Auto Map All Output Buttons

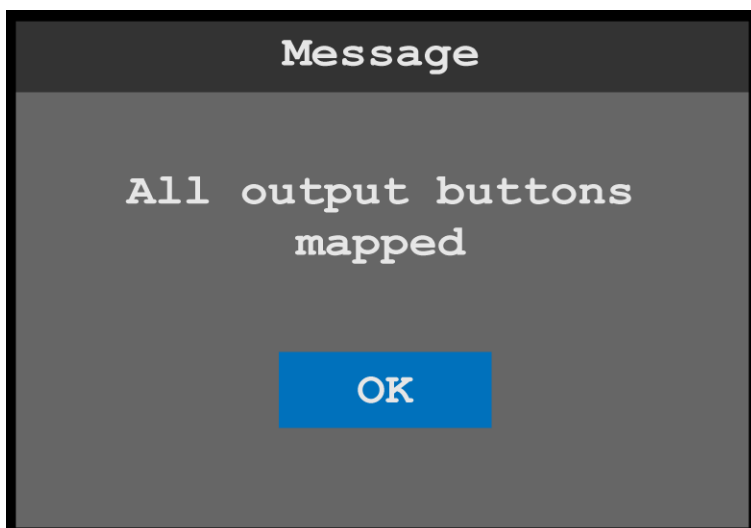


Image 6-56: All output buttons mapped message

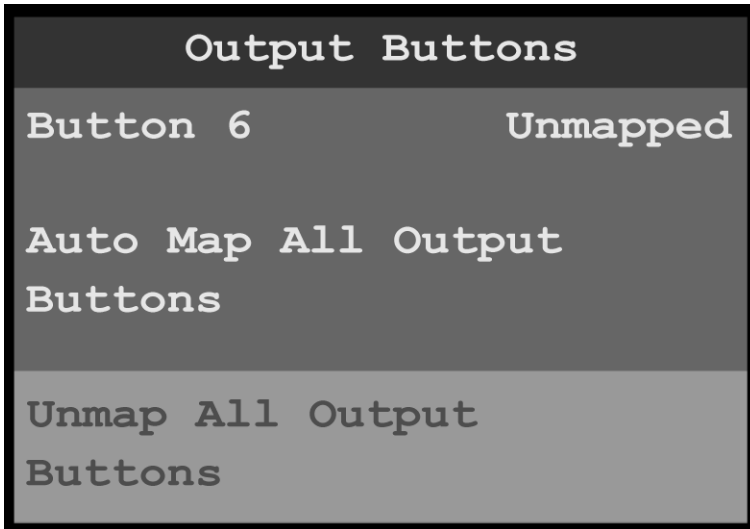


Image 6-57: Unmap All Output Buttons

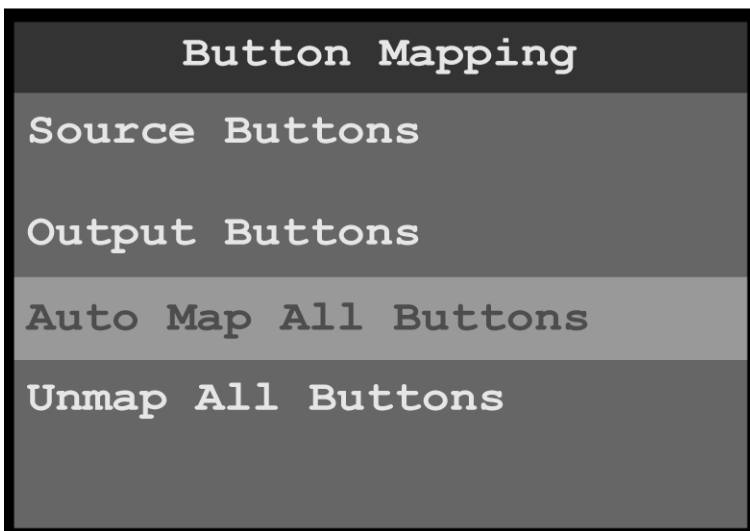


Image 6-58: Auto Map All Buttons

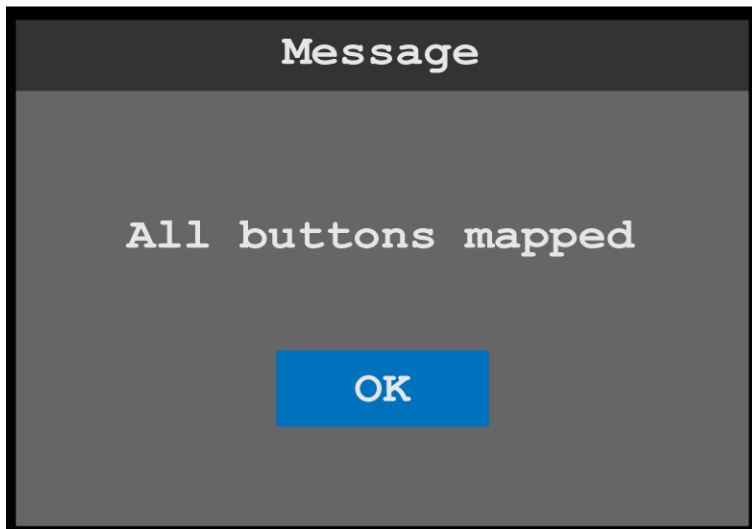


Image 6-59: All buttons mapped message

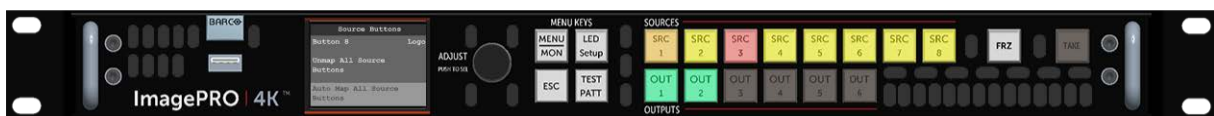


Image 6-60: Front-panel source and output buttons auto-mapped

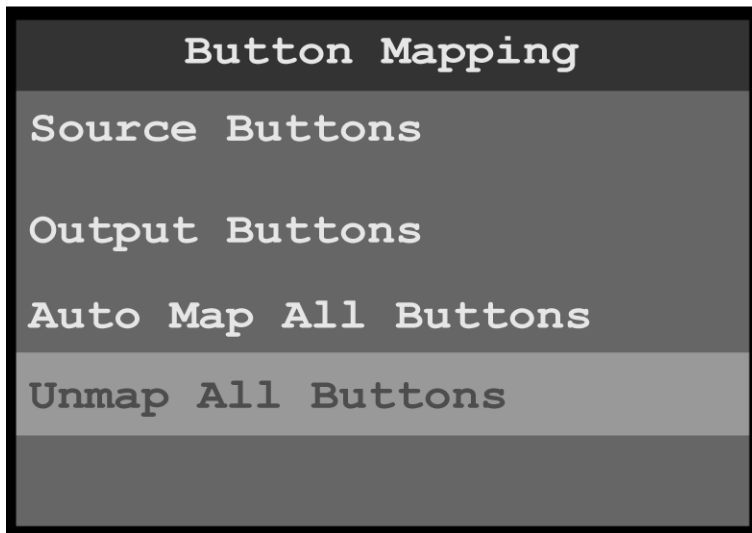


Image 6-61: Unmap All Buttons

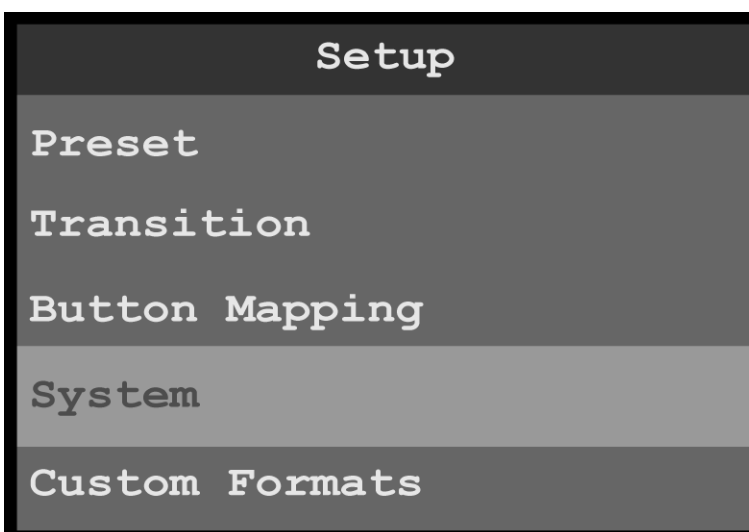


Image 6-63: Setup menu: System

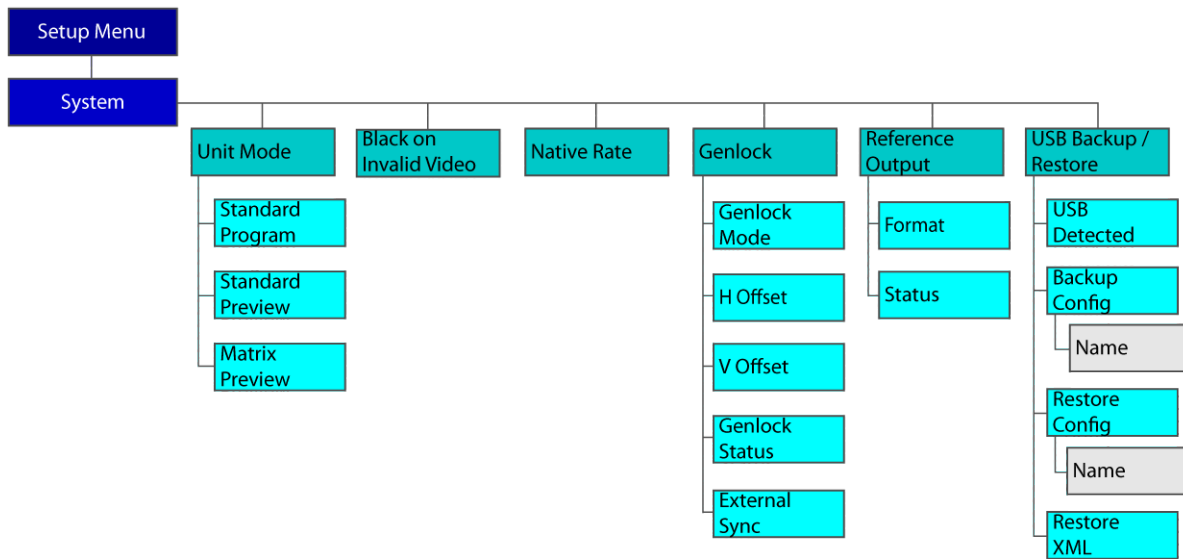


Image 6-64: System menu tree

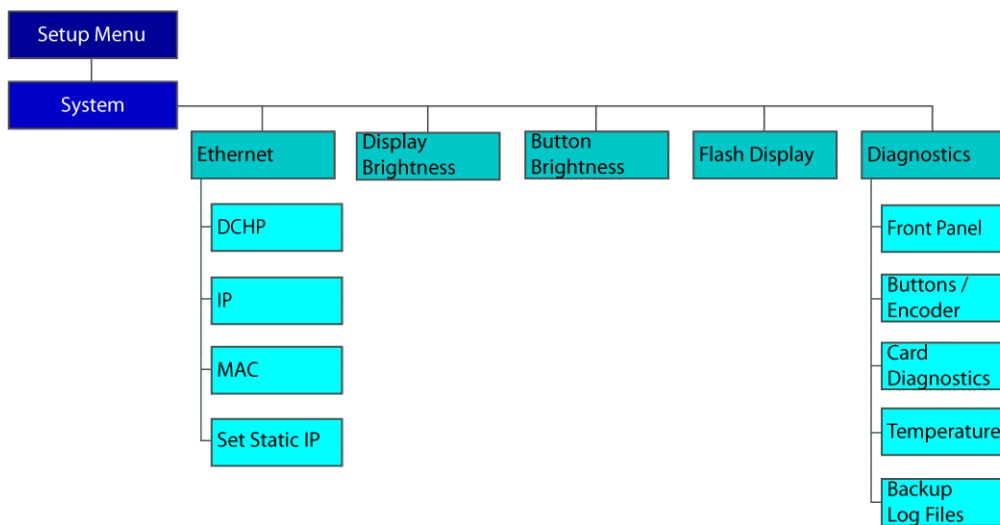


Image 6-65: System menu tree (Continued)

## Unit Mode

The ImagePRO–4K video processor can operate in one of three unit modes.

- In **Standard Program** mode, when the operator selects a source from the front panel that source is automatically transitioned to both Aux outputs.
- In **Standard Preview** mode the operator can preview the input on the Display screen, before taking it to program by pressing the **Take** button.  
Note that to preview the selected input on the display screen, the **MENU/MON** menu key must be set to monitor mode.
- In **Matrix Preview** mode the ImagePRO–4K video processor acts as if it were a scaling matrix switcher. Matrix Preview mode may be selected from the front panel of the unit, but it must be used through the EMTS GUI.

Standard Program and Standard Preview modes allow for a single input to route to up two Aux channels out. Because only one source is routed to both Aux channels at the same time, all six inputs can have a 4K60p

source connected. The system dynamically allocates input connector capacity as each source is actively switched. Each output connected to a display must be assigned to one of the two Aux channels. Even though all six output connectors can possibly show a picture, the output rate and "area of interest" are defined in the Aux channel(s).

Matrix Preview mode is capable of providing a single input to multiple outputs, as well as multiple inputs to multiple outputs. Because this mode is capable of routing more than one input to the outputs, the signal bandwidth capacities for each connector must be defined by the user. Each output can have a different signal rate from the others, as well as a unique "area of interest."

#### To select the unit mode...

1. Select **Unit Mode** on the System menu.  
Once Unit Mode is selected, the highlight bar turns from gray to cyan. Turning the adjust knob scrolls through the available unit modes.

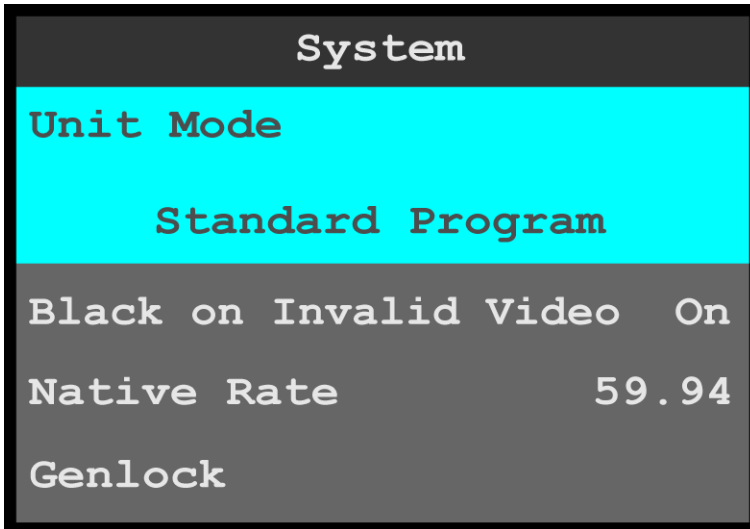


Image 6-66: System menu: Unit Mode

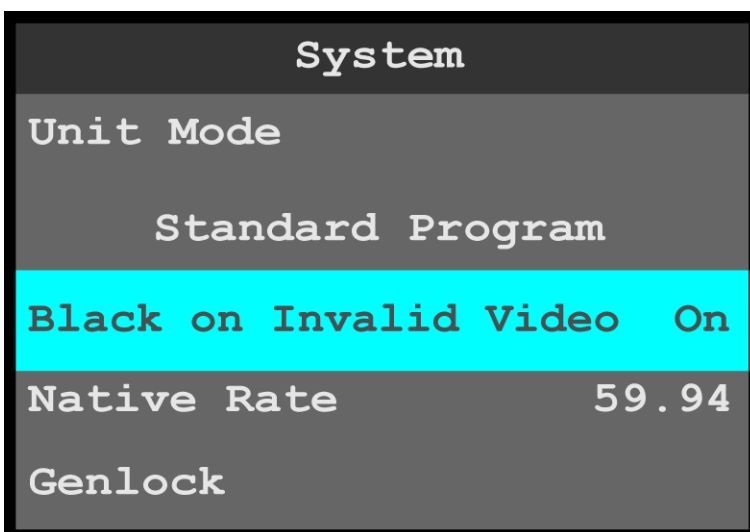


Image 6-67: System menu: Black on Invalid Video

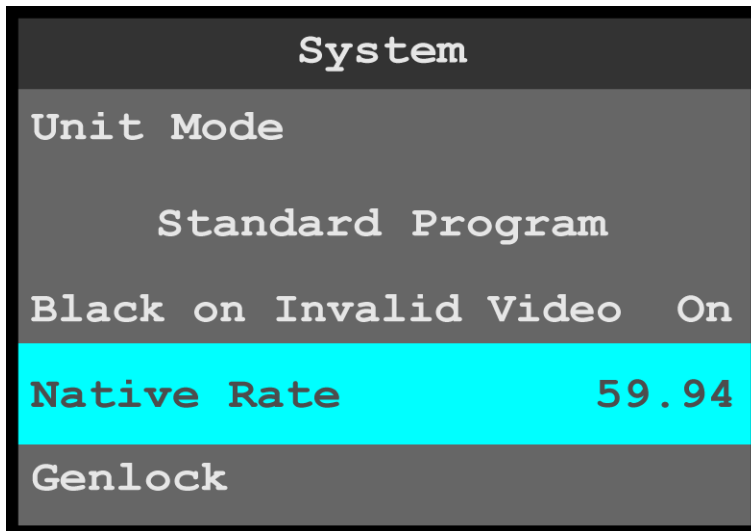


Image 6-68: System menu: Native Rate

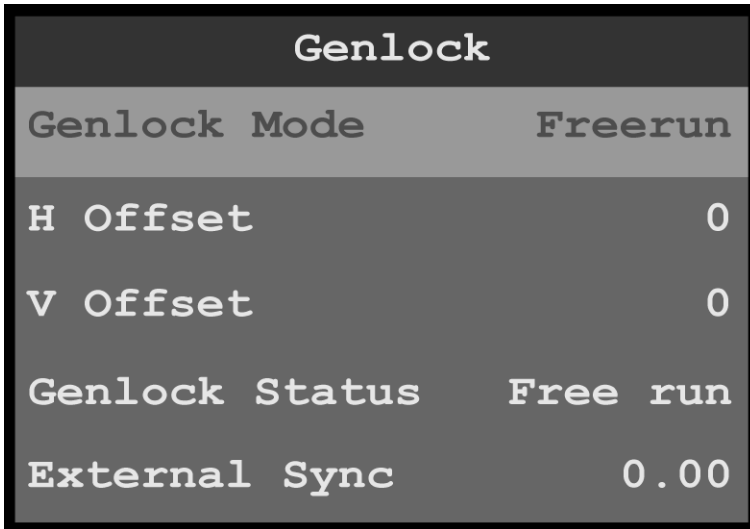


Image 6-69: System menu: Genlock

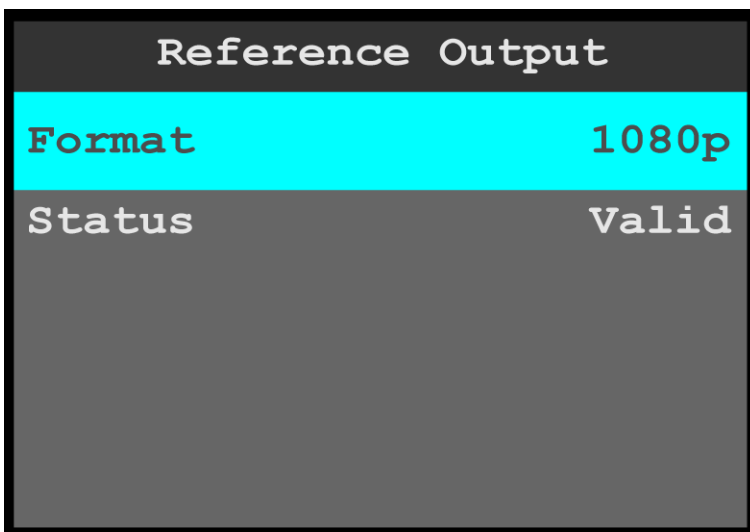


Image 6-70: Reference Output menu: Format

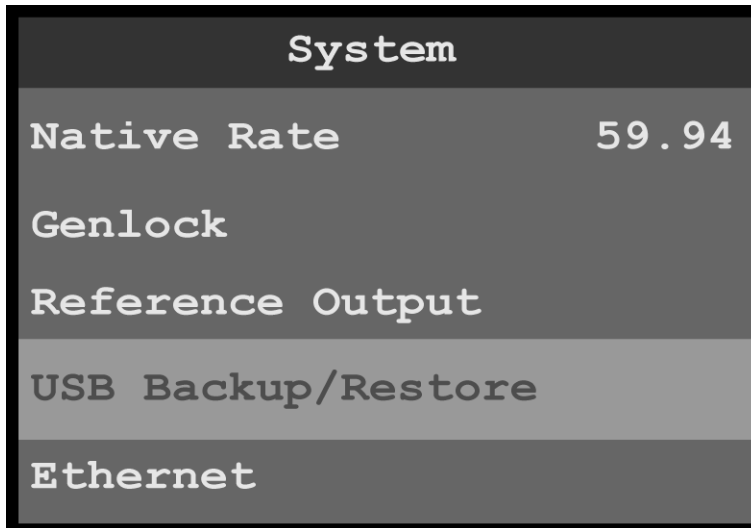


Image 6-71: System menu: USB Backup/Restore

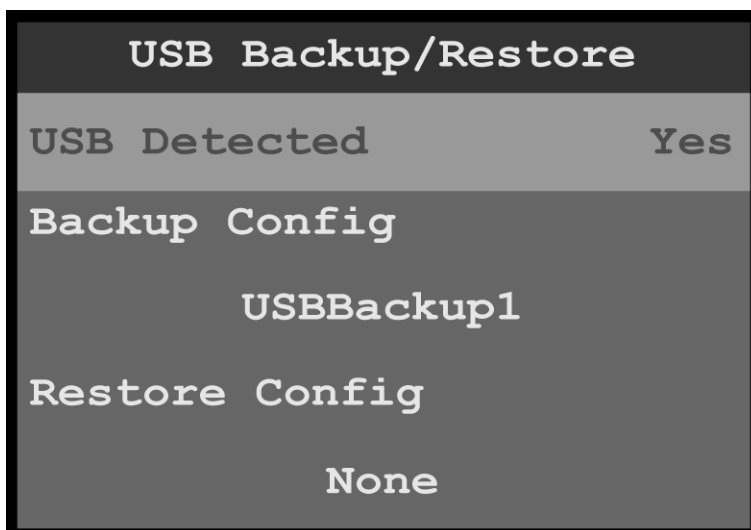


Image 6-72: USB Backup/Restore: USB Detected

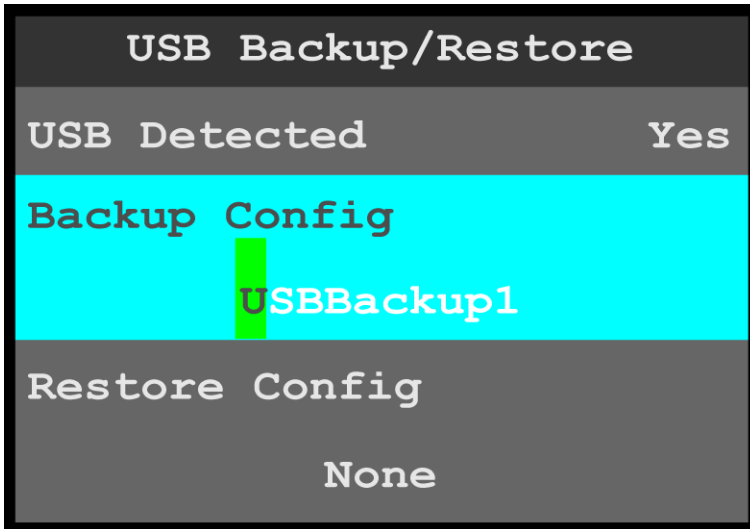


Image 6-73: USB Backup/Restore: Backup Config

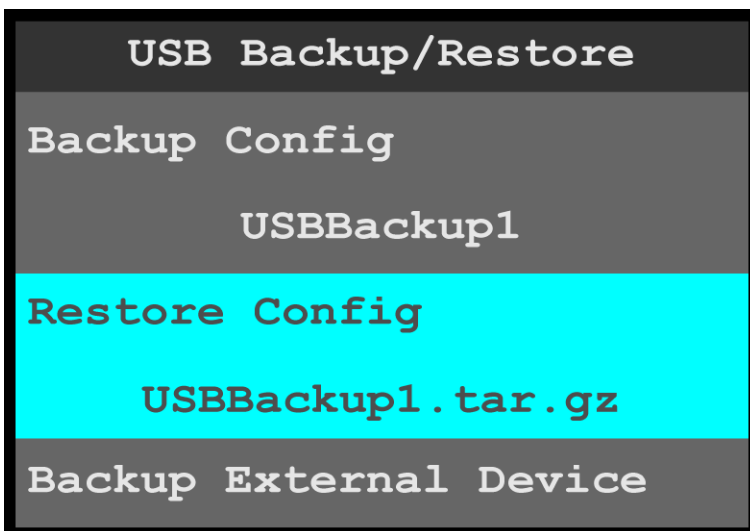


Image 6-74: USB Backup/Restore: Restore Config

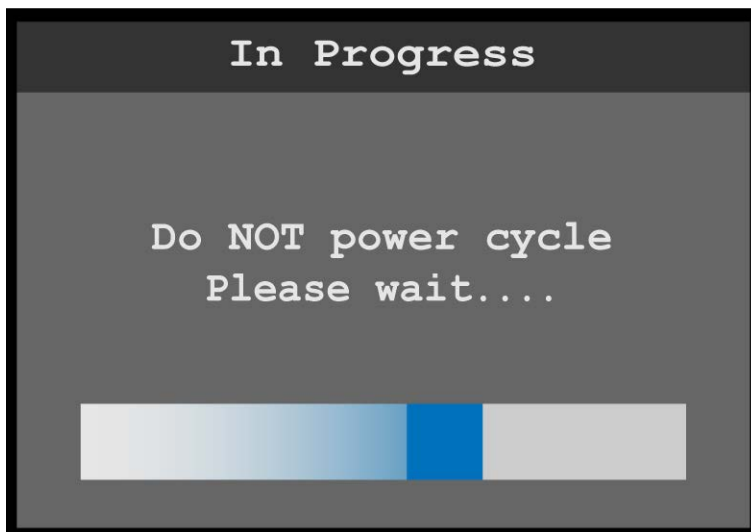


Image 6-75: Backup In Progress message

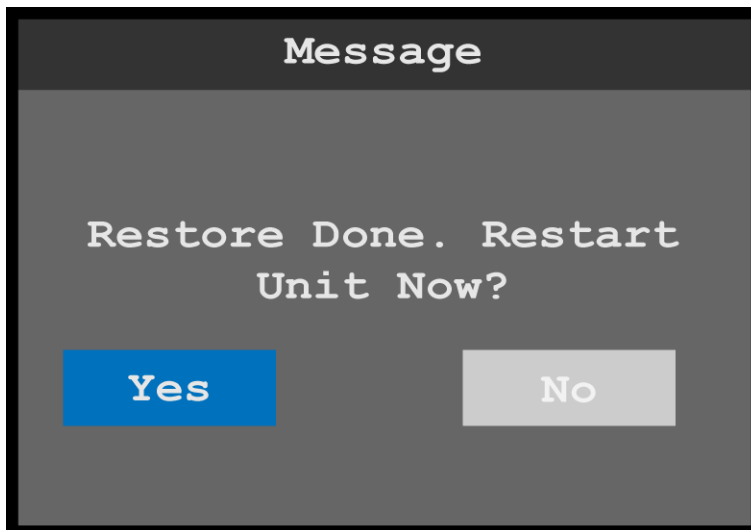


Image 6-76: Restore Done Restart message

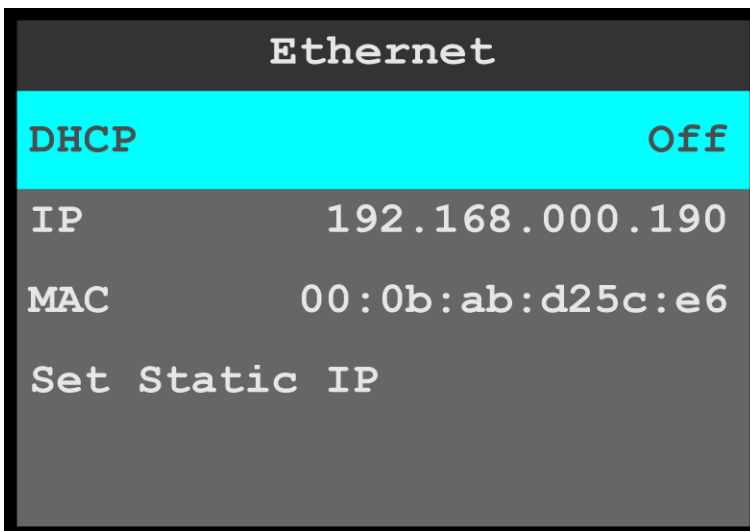


Image 6-78: Ethernet menu

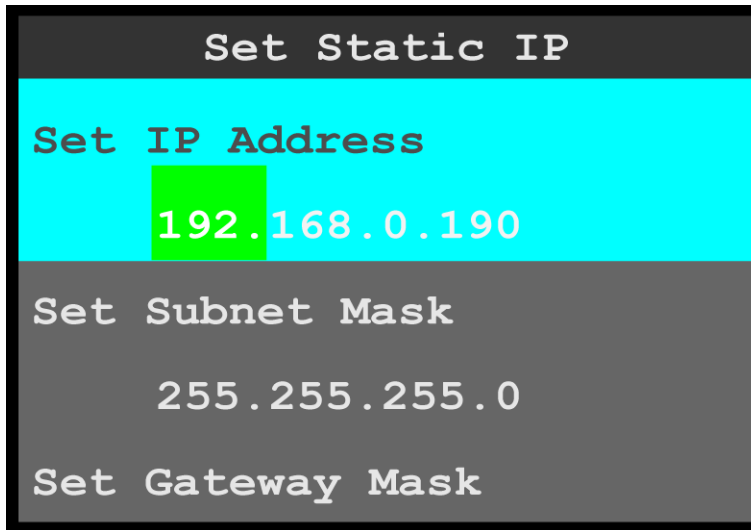


Image 6-79: Ethernet menu: Set Static IP

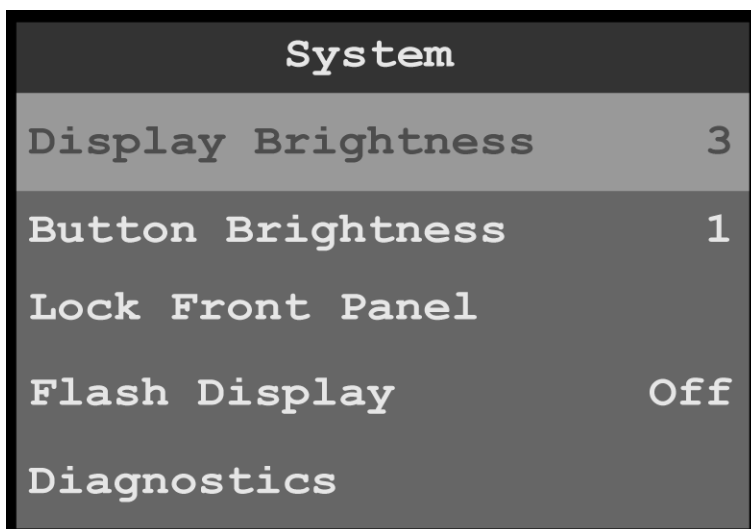


Image 6-80: System menu: Display Brightness

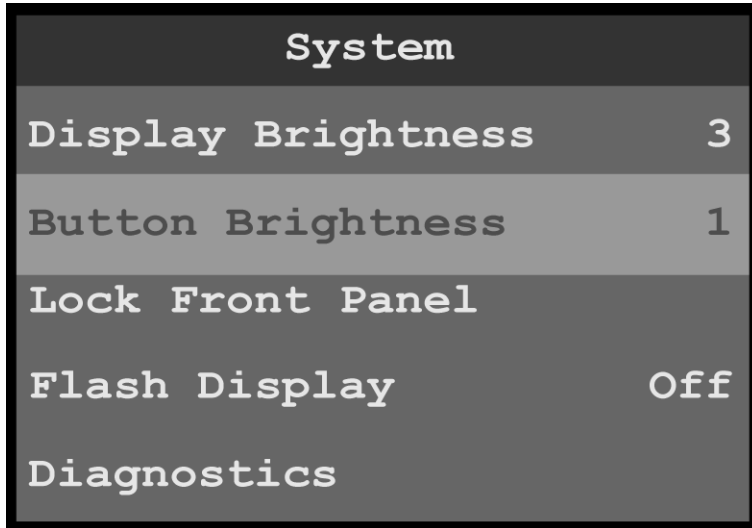


Image 6-81: System menu: Button Brightness

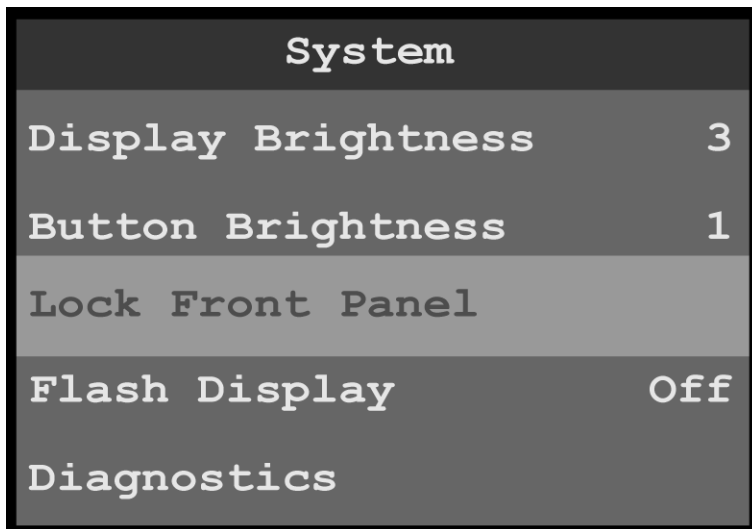


Image 6-82: System menu: Lock Front Panel

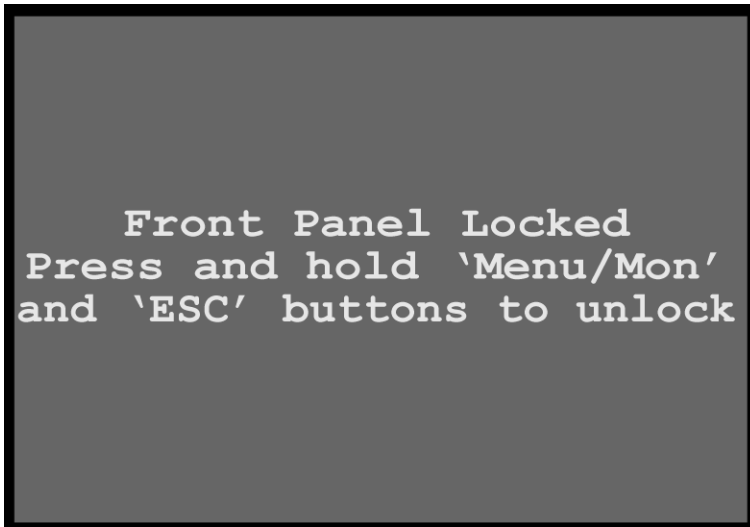


Image 6-83: Lock Front Panel message

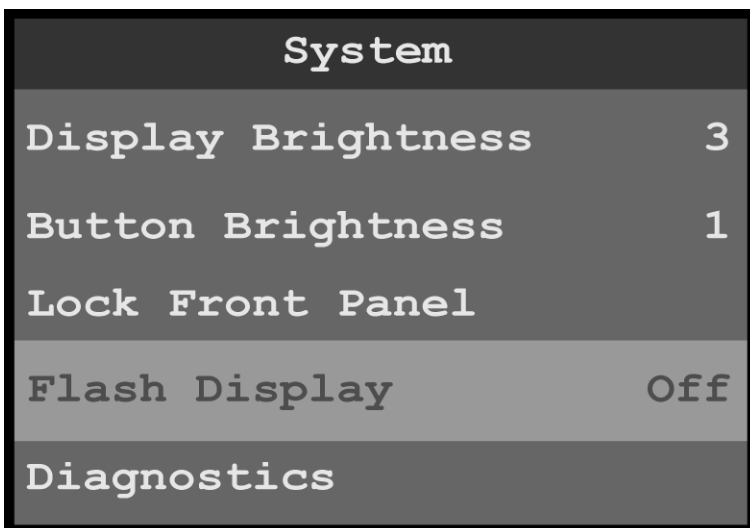


Image 6-84: System menu: Flash Display

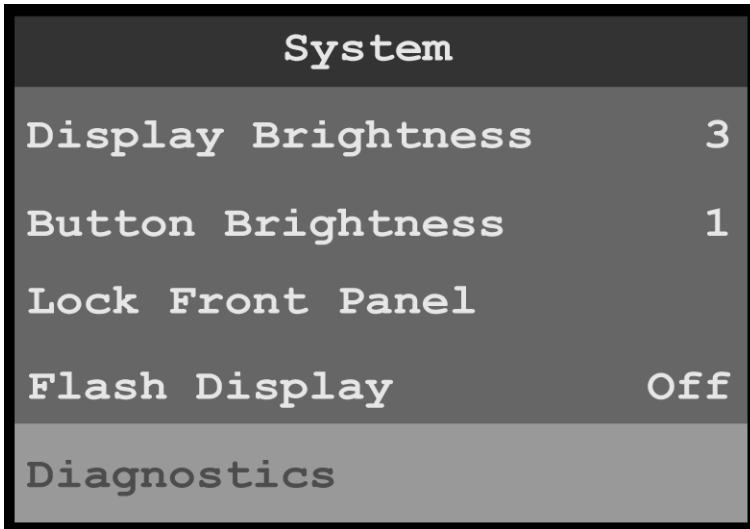


Image 6-85: System menu: Diagnostics

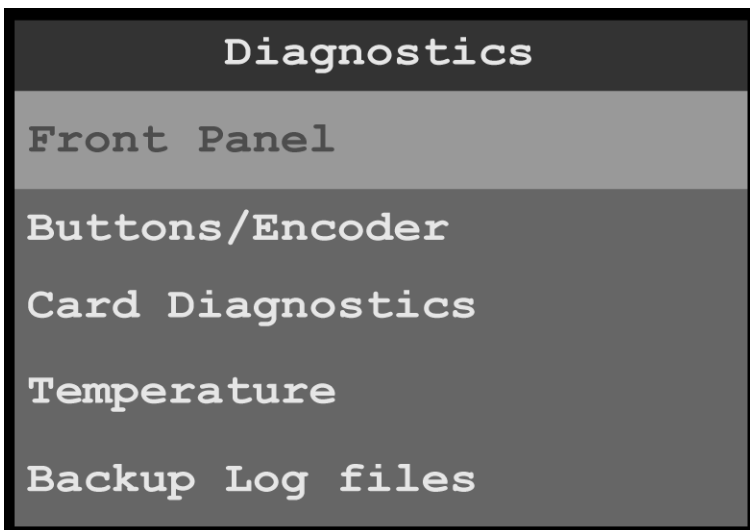
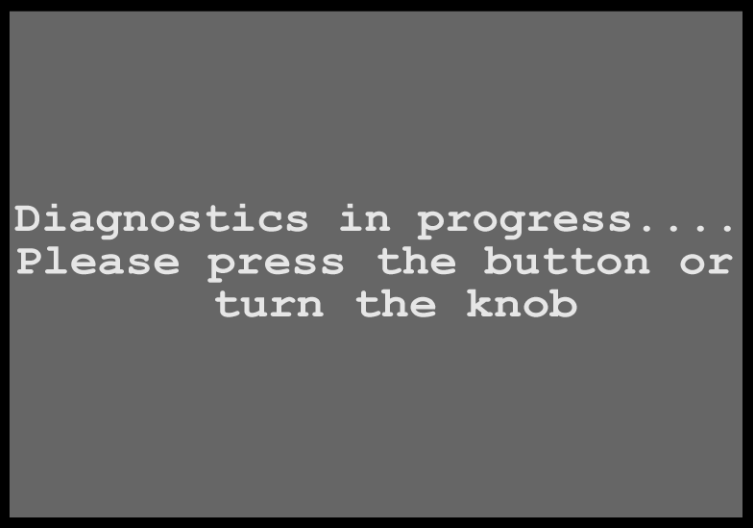


Image 6-86: Diagnostics menu: Front Panel

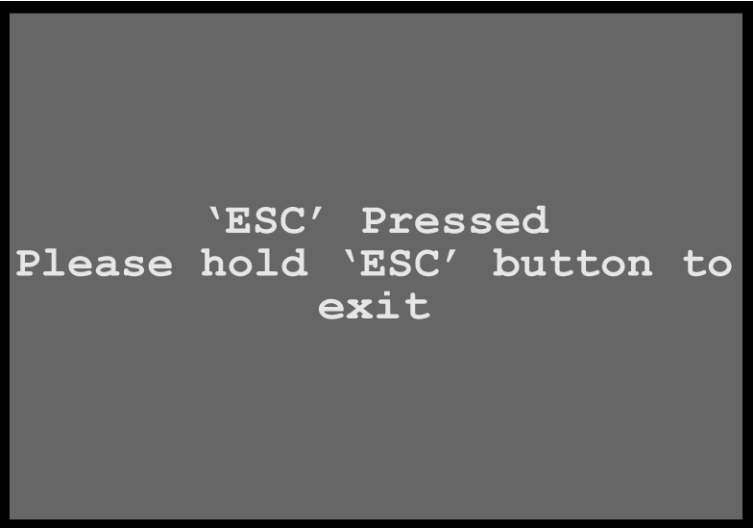

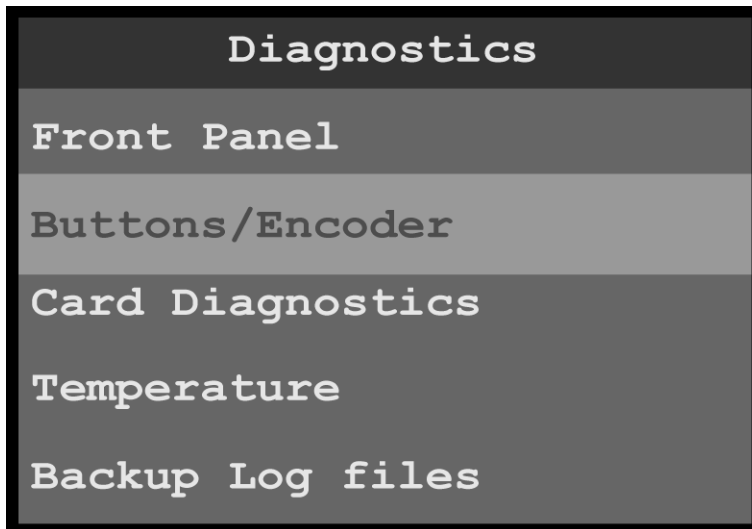


Image 6-89: Diagnostics menu: Buttons/Encoder

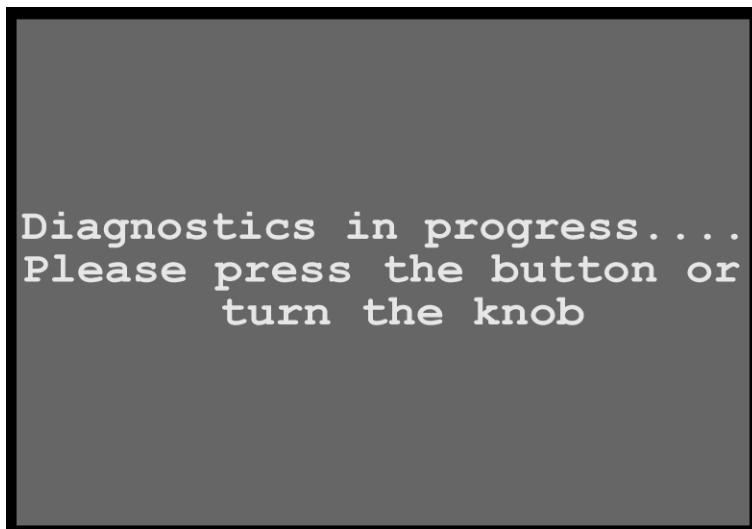


Image 6-90: Diagnostics in Progress

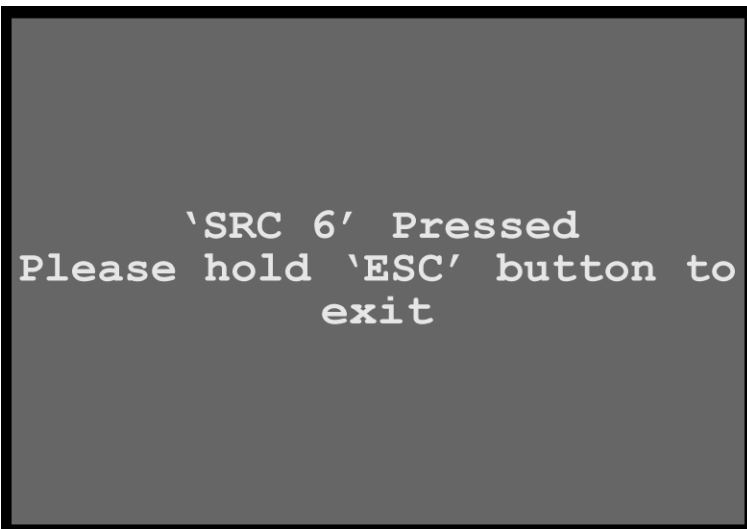


Image 6-91: Exit front-panel diagnostics

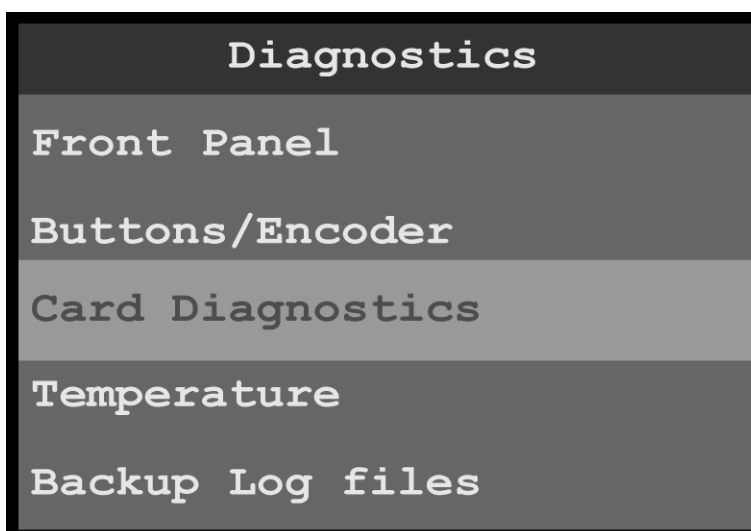


Image 6-92: Diagnostics menu: Card Diagnostics

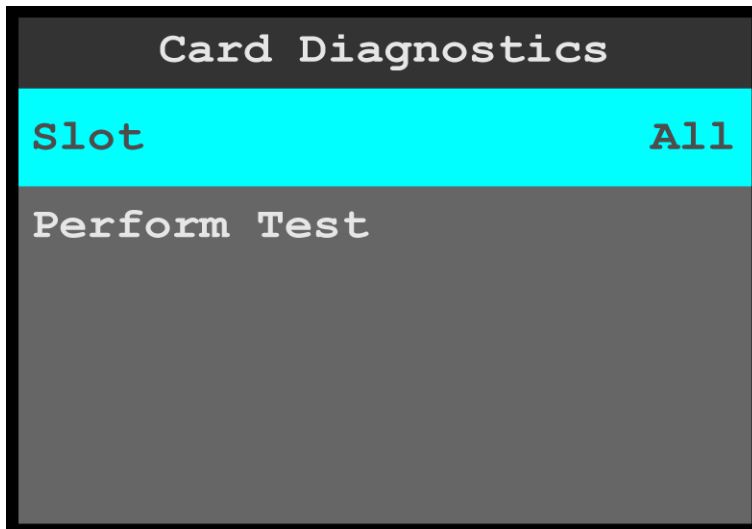


Image 6-93: Card Diagnostics menu: Slot

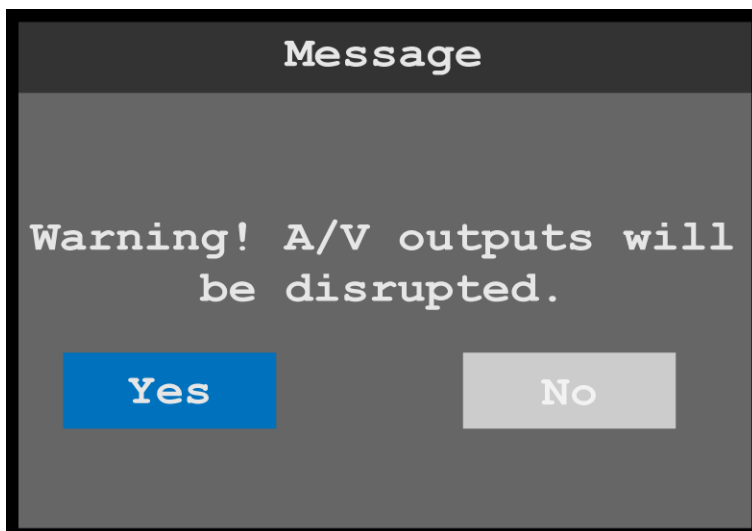


Image 6-94: Card Diagnostics: Slot warning message

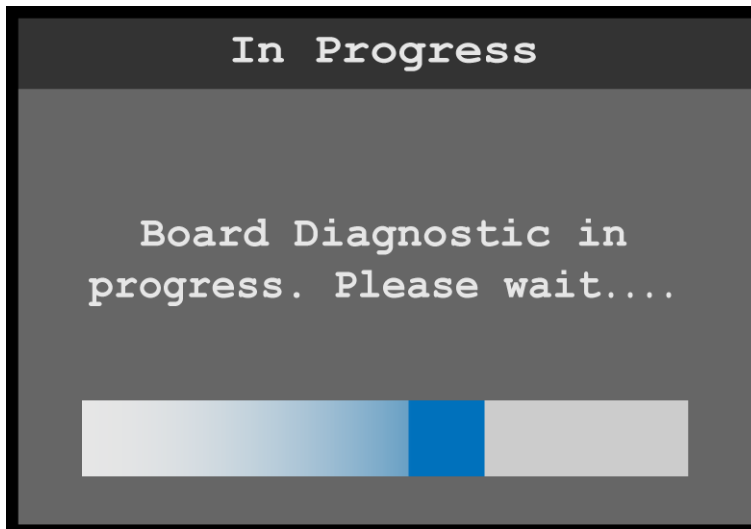


Image 6-95: Board Diagnostic in Progress message

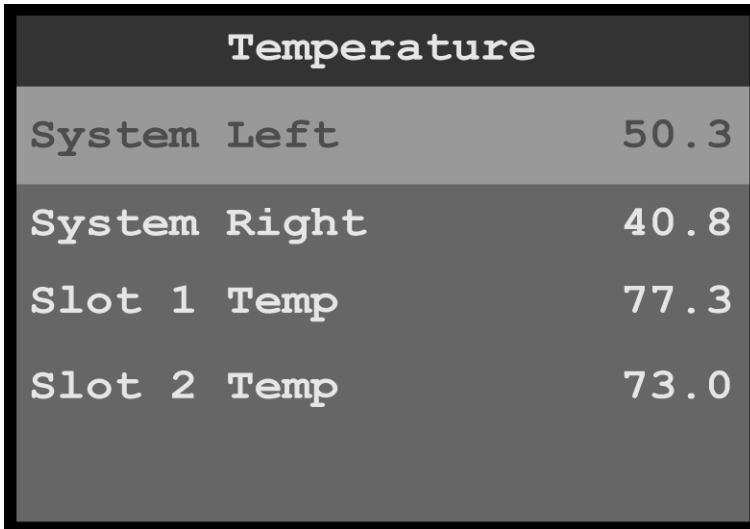

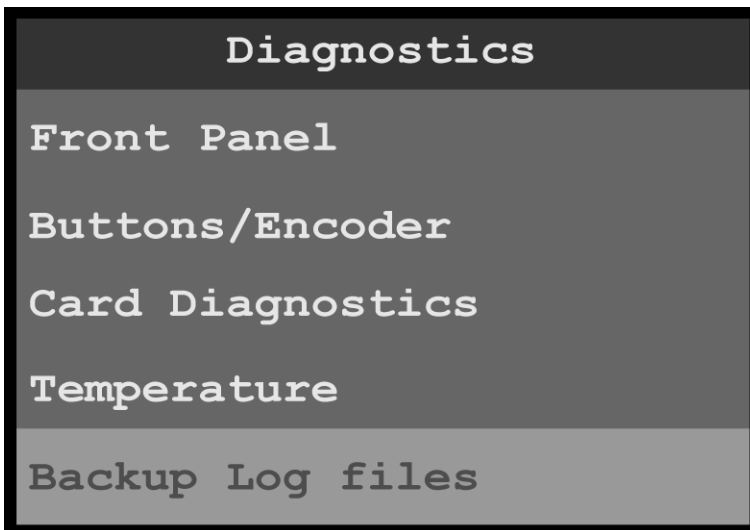


Image 6-98: Diagnostics menu: Backup Log Files

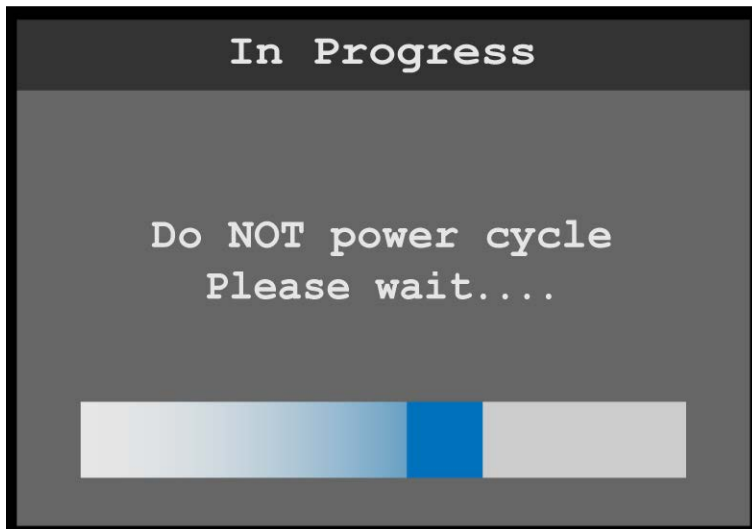


Image 6-99: Backup in progress

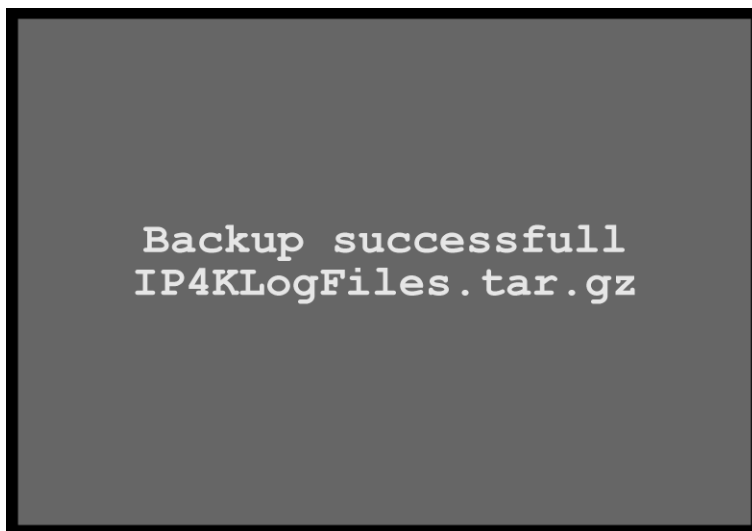


Image 6-100: Backup successful message

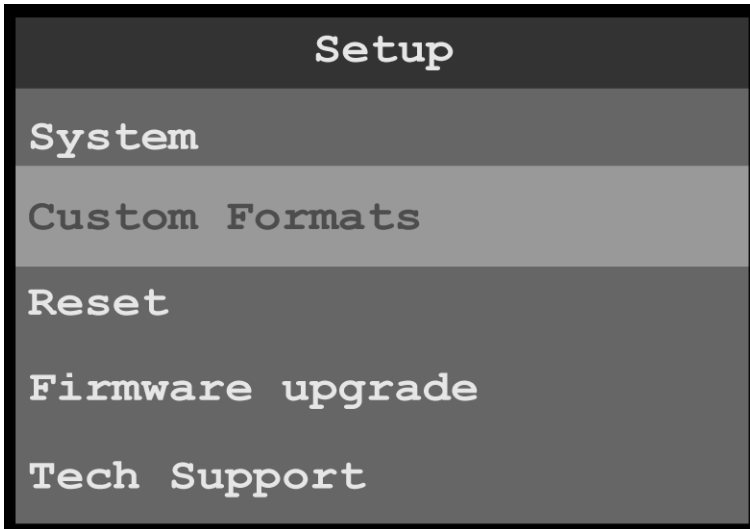


Image 6-101: Setup menu: Custom Formats

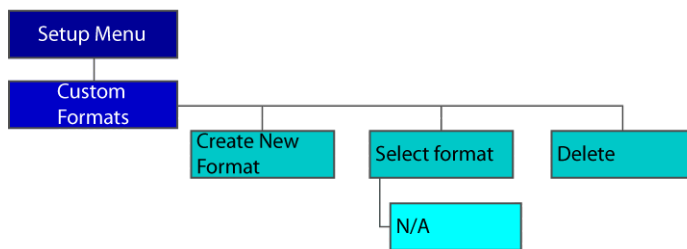


Image 6-102: Custom Formats menu tree: with no custom formats

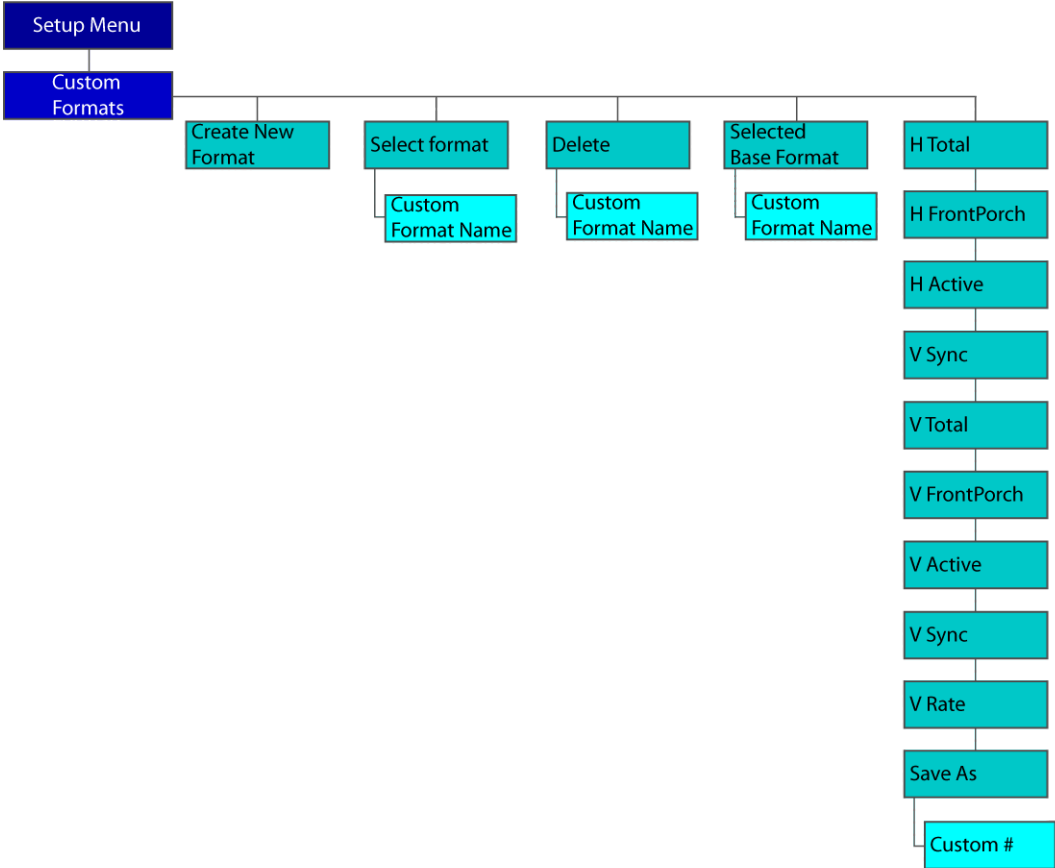



Image 6-103: Custom Formats menu tree: with custom formats

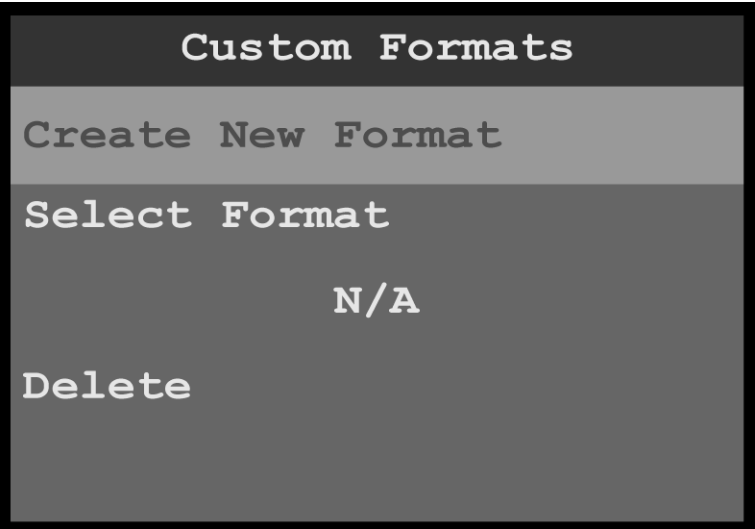


Image 6-104: Custom Formats menu: Create New Format

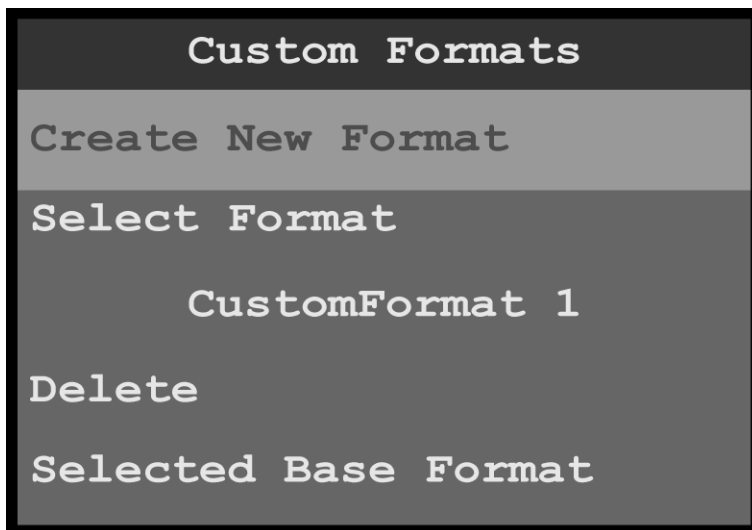


Image 6-105: Custom Formats menu: Created format

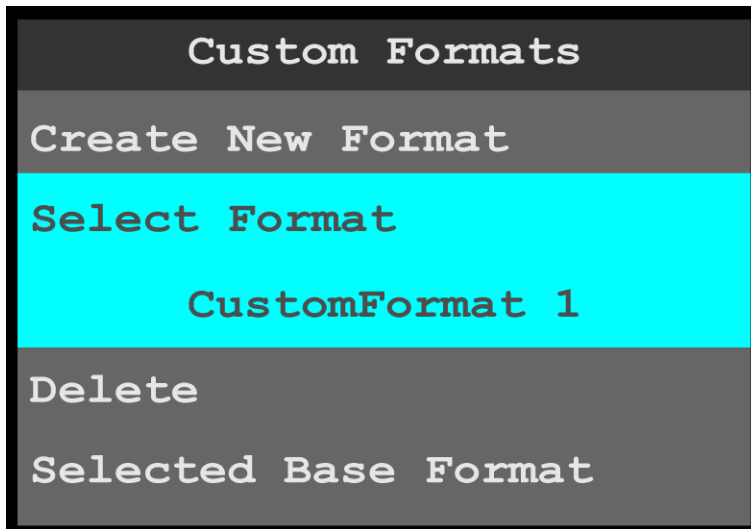


Image 6-106: Custom Formats menu: Select Format

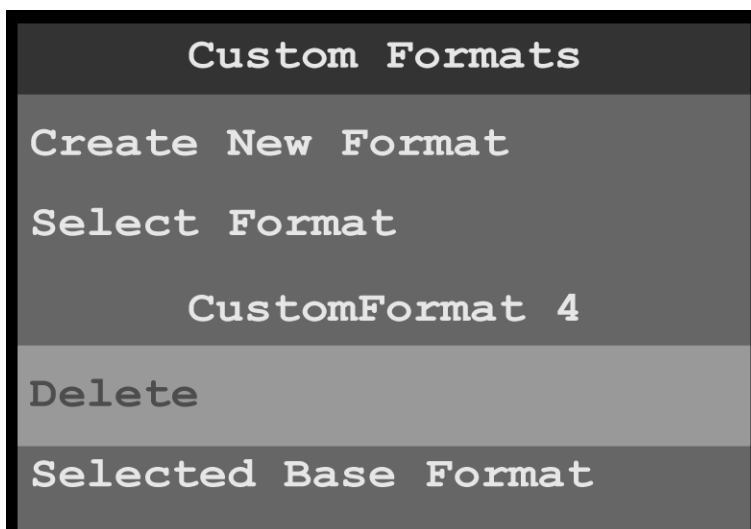


Image 6-107: Custom Formats menu: Delete

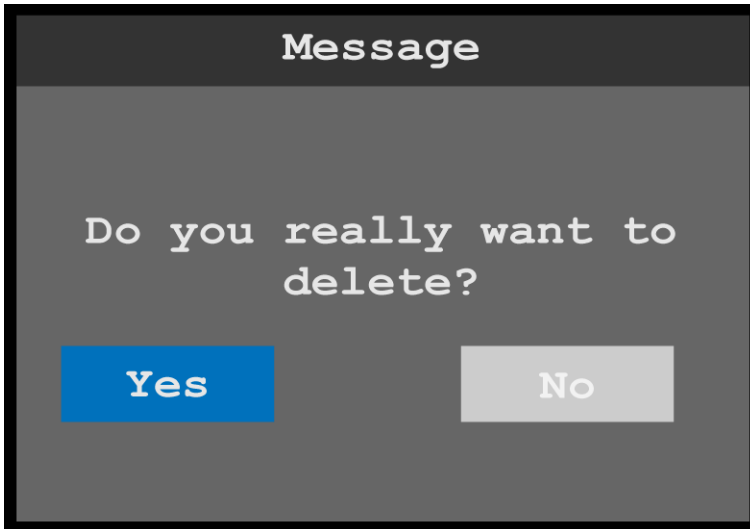


Image 6-108: Delete message

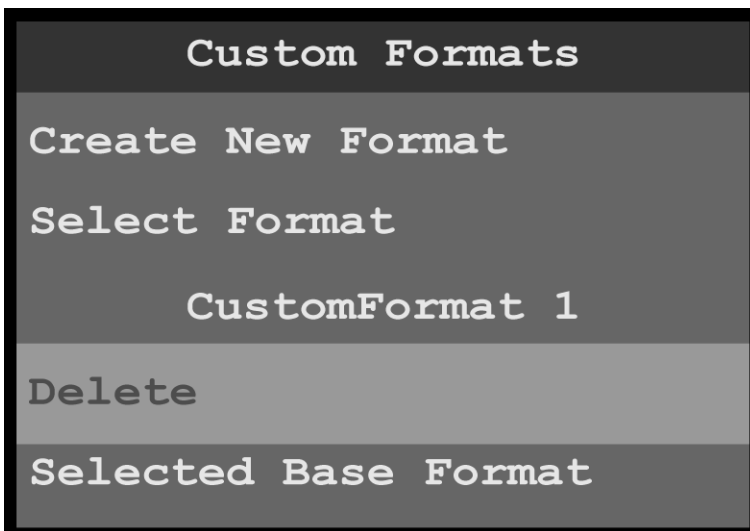


Image 6-109: Custom Formats menu: Deleted format

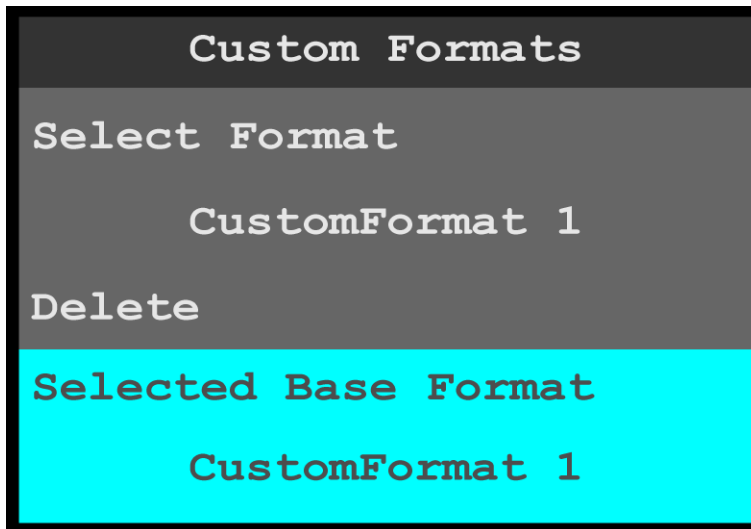


Image 6-110: Custom Formats menu: Selected Base Format

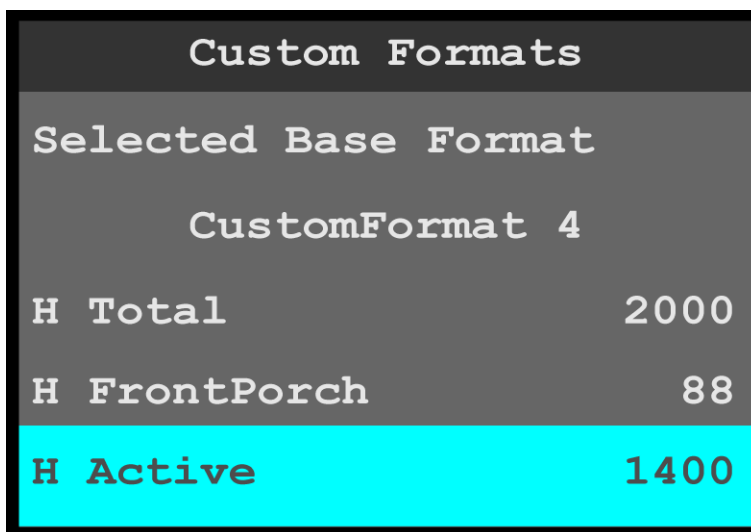


Image 6-111: Custom Formats menu: H Active

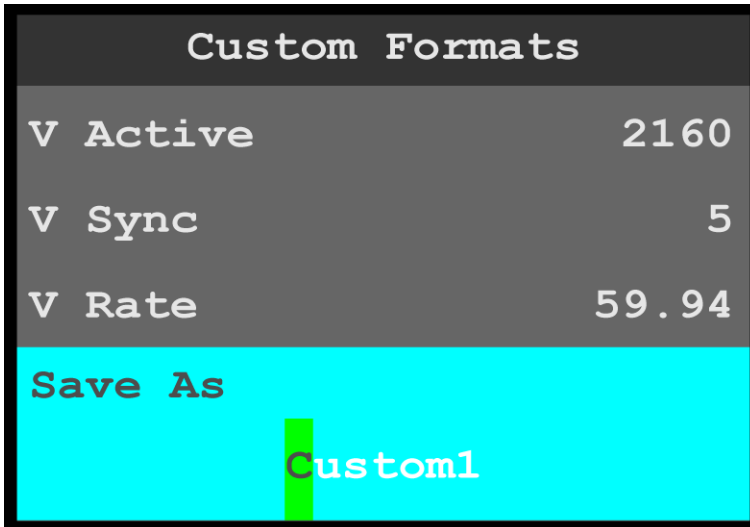


Image 6-112: Custom Formats menu: Save As

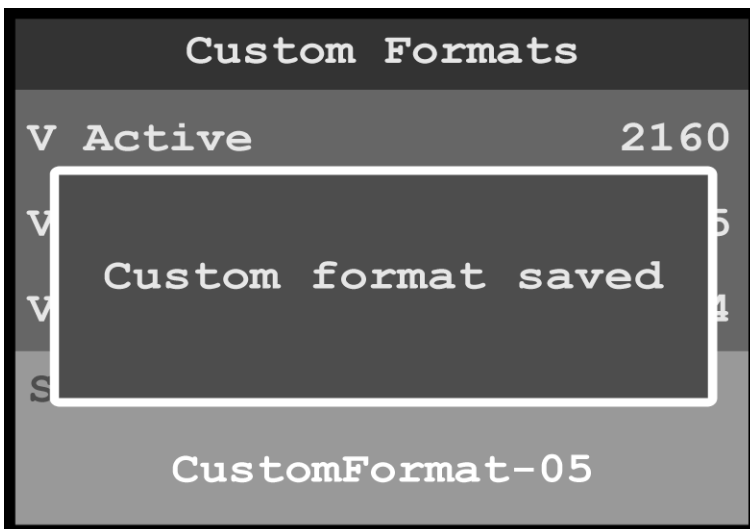


Image 6-113: Custom Formats menu: Save As

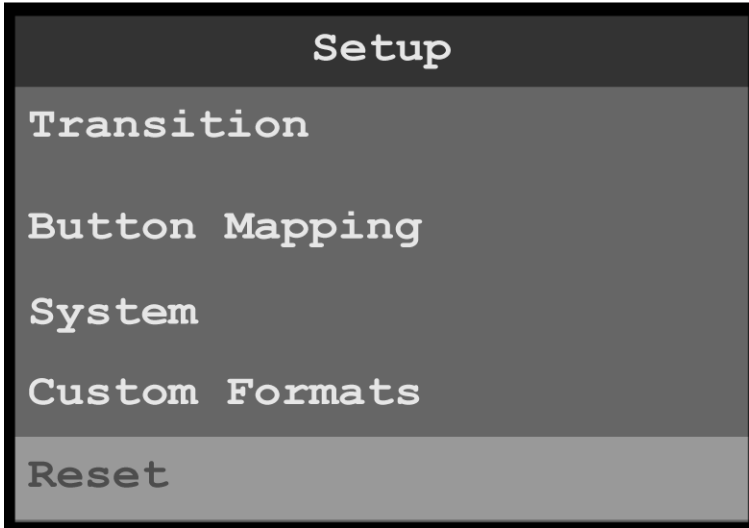


Image 6-114: Setup menu: Reset

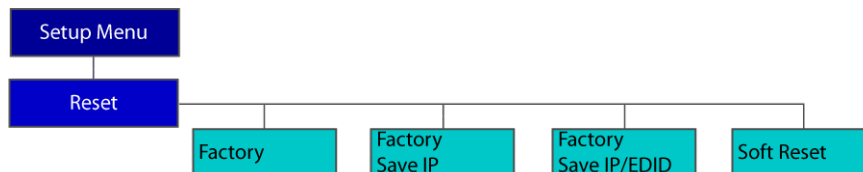


Image 6-115: Reset menu tree

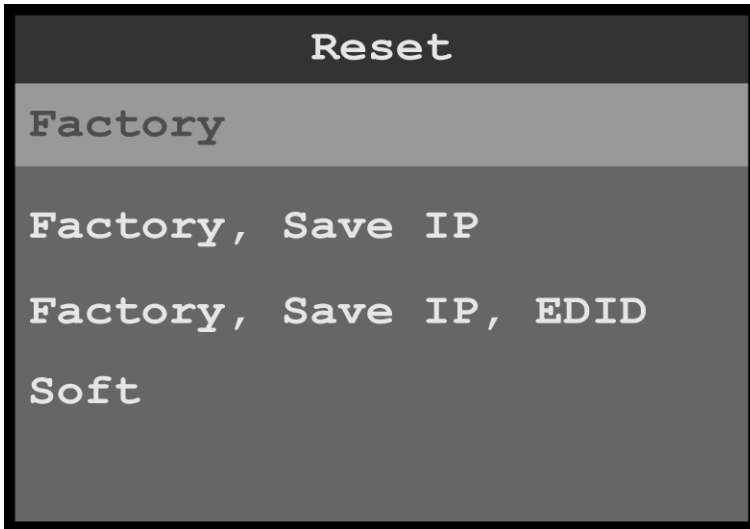


Image 6-116: Reset menu: Factory

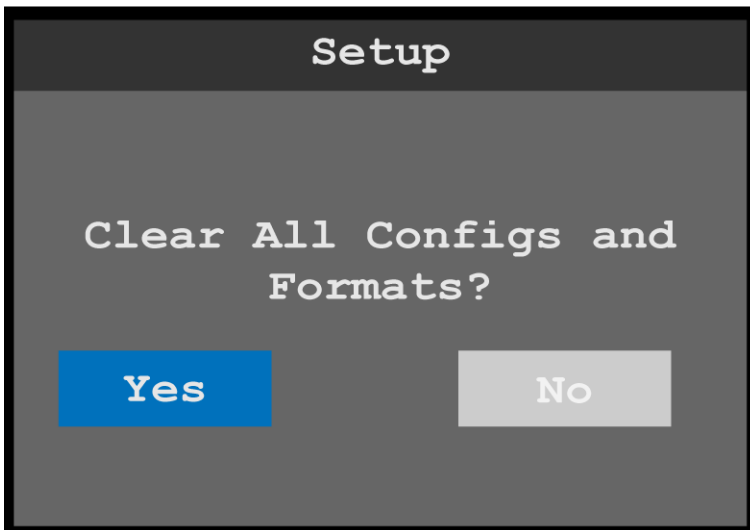


Image 6-117: Reset confirmation

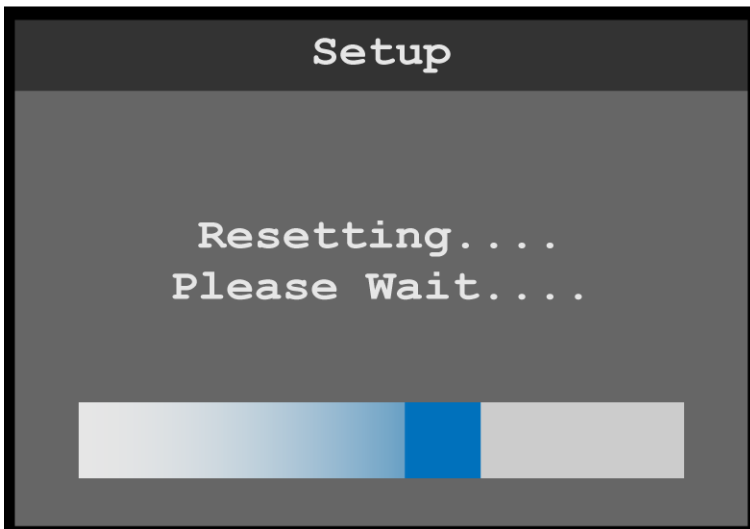


Image 6-118: Reset progress bar

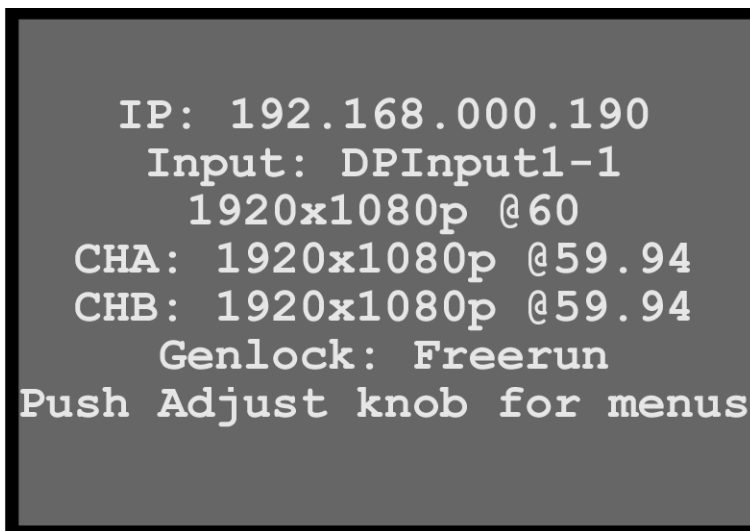


Image 6-119: Status after reset

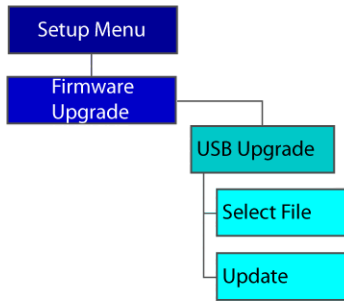


Image 6-120: Firmware upgrade menu tree

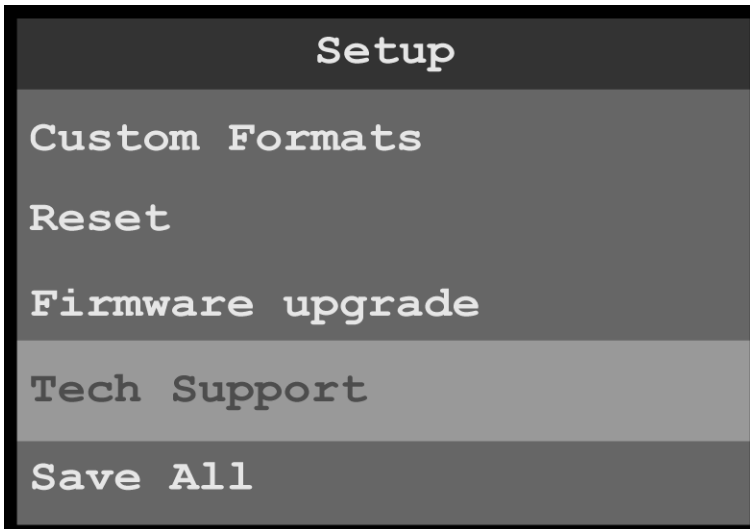


Image 6-121: Setup menu: Tech Support

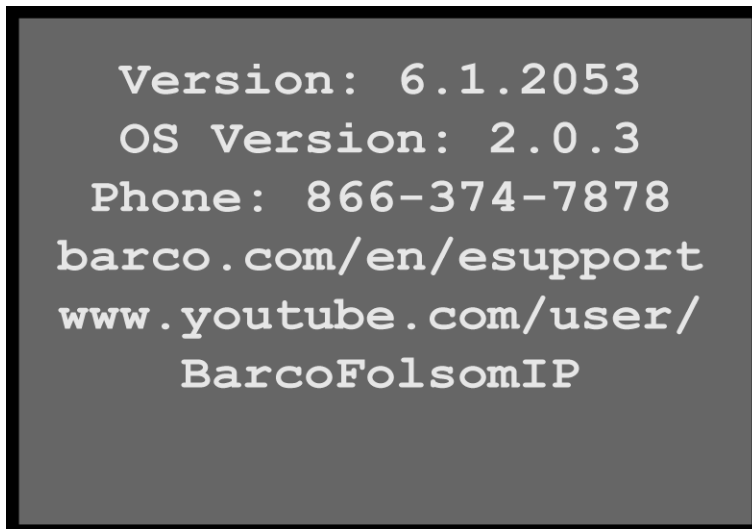


Image 6-122: Tech Support menu

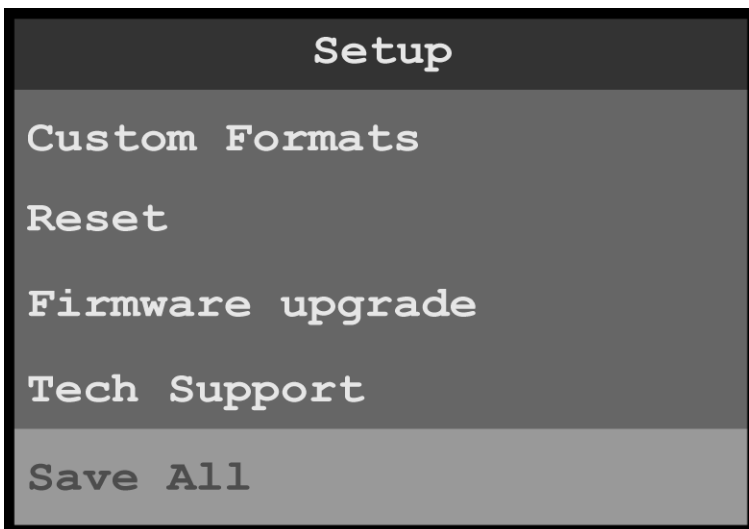


Image 6-123: Setup menu: Save All

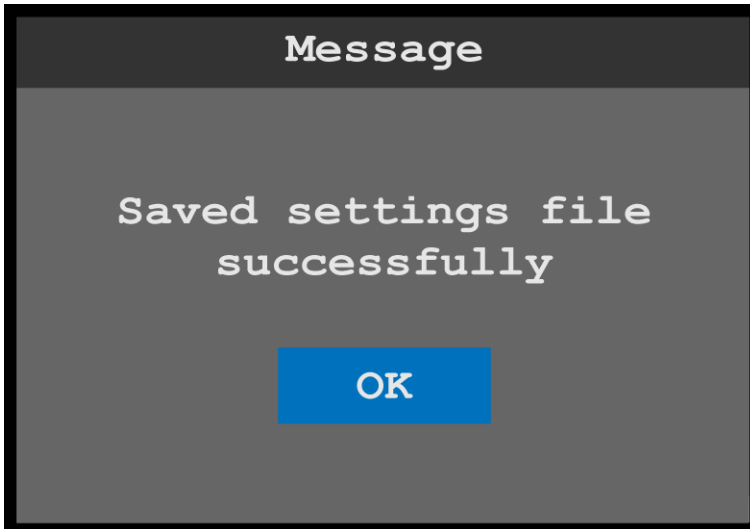


Image 6-124: Saved settings message

## About this chapter

As well as front panel control, the ImagePRO–4K can also be controlled remotely via Event Master Toolset (EMTS), starting with version 6.1. This toolset software release adds control for the ImagePRO–4K. Starting with version 6.2 and higher, EMTS can be used to control all Event Master processors, in addition to ImagePRO–4K. Until version 6.2 is released, E2, S3, and Ex should continue to remain on version 6.0, or earlier, firmware.

## General

In the EMTS GUI, add the detected ImagePRO–4K processor as a new system and click the ImagePRO–4K banner at the bottom of the represented unit. Next, click the contextual adjust tab to review the processor's main settings and reference output rate. The Setup tab allows the user to adjust the system mode, transition type, logo index, and matte color. The Status tab shows the user if there are any temperature warnings or stalled fans.

Users can also map outputs to the Aux by clicking on the individual outputs and then updating them on the Adjust tab.

## 7.1 EMTS GUI: Configuration menu

### Description

The Configuration menu, shown in the following illustration, is the first page you see when you access the ImagePRO-4K from the EMTS GUI.

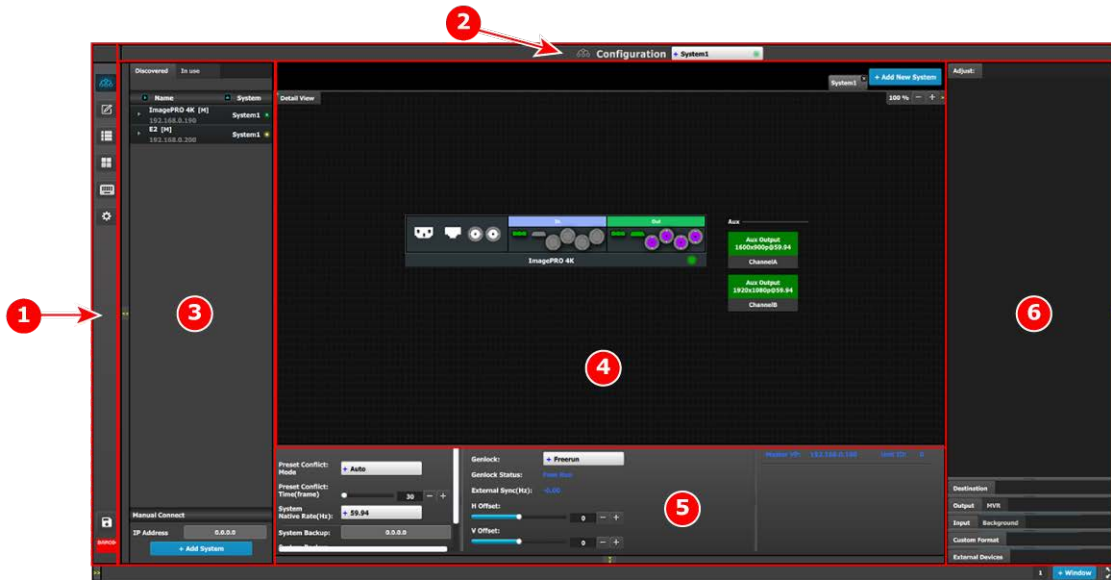


Image 7-1: EMTS GUI orientation

1. **Menu navigation bar** – The menu navigation bar allows the user to choose from among the available menus: Configuration, Programming, Cue, Multiviewer, Controller, or Settings.
2. **Title bar** – The title bar shows the current menu and the currently selected system.
3. **Selection area** – The selection area contains tabs for “Discovered” systems and systems “In use.” It also contains a field for entering IP addresses and a button for adding systems.
4. **Diagram area** – The diagram area contains graphic representations of the system in use.
5. **Modifier area** – The modifier area contains system controls, such as Native Rate and Genlock status.
6. **Configuration area** – The Configuration area contains tabs and panels on which users perform all needed adjustments. This area is largely empty until the user selects an item from the Diagram area.

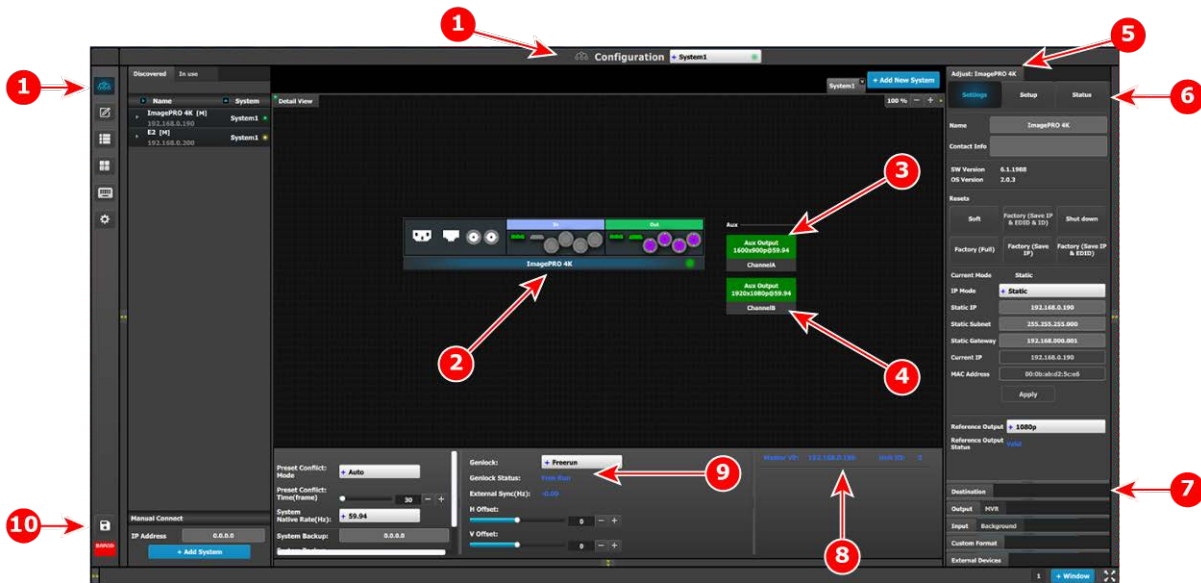


Image 7-2: Configuration menu: Unit Adjust tab

1. **Configuration menu icon** – This icon shows that the Configuration menu has been selected. This is the default menu that is displayed when the GUI is started. The menu navigation bar allows the user to choose from among the available menus: Configuration, Programming, Cue, Multiviewer, Controller, or Settings.
2. **Graphic representation of the ImagePRO-4K unit** – The diagram area displays a graphic representation of the selected device, in this case an ImagePRO-4K video processor. To select the entire unit, click on the name of the unit at the bottom of the graphic representation. To select a specific input or output, click on that input or output.
3. **Aux / Output Channel A** – The diagram area also displays graphic representations of the Aux /Output channels: A and B. To select an Aux / Output channel, click on that channel.
4. **Aux / Output Channel B** – The diagram area also displays graphic representations of the Aux /Output channels: A and B. To select an Aux / Output channel, click on that channel.
5. **Adjust tab** – The Adjust tab provides panels that allow users to adjust settings for the selected unit, input, output, Aux /Output channel.
6. **Settings, Setup, and Status subtabs** — The Settings and Setup subtabs allow users to adjust system settings. The Status subtab displays the status of the selected item (unit, input, output, etc.). These subtabs differ, depending on the item selected. For example, the subtabs of an input Adjust tab are Main, Format, Color, and Contact Info; the subtabs of an output Adjust tab are Main, Format, and Connector Settings.
7. **Selection tabs** — These tabs allow users to select different parts of a system to adjust.
8. **IP address and Unit ID** — This area displays the IP address and unit ID of the selected unit.
9. **System settings** — This area displays and allows control of Genlock status, external sync, H offset, V offset, preset conflict mode, preset conflict time, system native rate, and system backup status.
10. **Save All** – Clicking the **Save All** icon saves all currently selected system settings.

## 7.2 EMTS GUI: Programming menu

### Description

The programming page is where the event is set up and everything comes together. Users can define sources from inputs, assign layers and backgrounds into screens and create User keys and presets and more. Once programmed and defined this is where the show is played back as well.

1. **Resources area** – This area contains the available resources for programming and playback, as inputs and sources. Also in this area the still store (logo) images are shown.
2. **Workspace / Programming Diagram area** – For each destination, super destination, or destination group, the Program and Preview screens can be viewed individually by selecting the corresponding tab. All Program and Preview screens can be viewed simultaneously by selecting the “View All” button. The space between Program and Preview has Layouts, a function where a certain group of destinations can be laid out in the workspace.
- 2a. **Preview ChannelB** – Preview ChannelB shows the signal that is active on ChannelB and assigned to Preview (PVW).
- 2b. **Program ChannelB** – Program ChannelB shows the signal that is active on ChannelB on Program (PRG) to output.
- 2c. **Preview ChannelA** – Preview ChannelA shows the signal that is active on ChannelA and assigned to Preview (PVW).
- 2d. **Program ChannelA** – Program ChannelA shows the signal that is active on ChannelA on Program (PRG) to output.
3. **Workspace / System wide function area** – This area contains Layer alignment adjustments and controls to manage the Preview/Program screens.
4. **Adjustment area** — The menus in this area provide control of parameters for selected layer and source. These can be modified and managed. This is where creation of User Keys and presets is done.

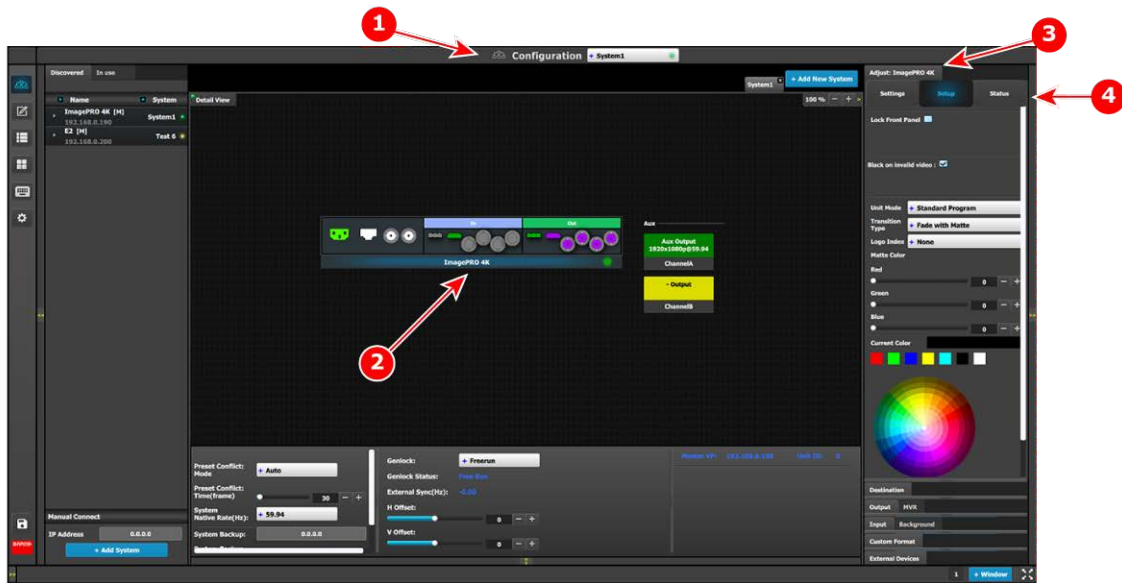
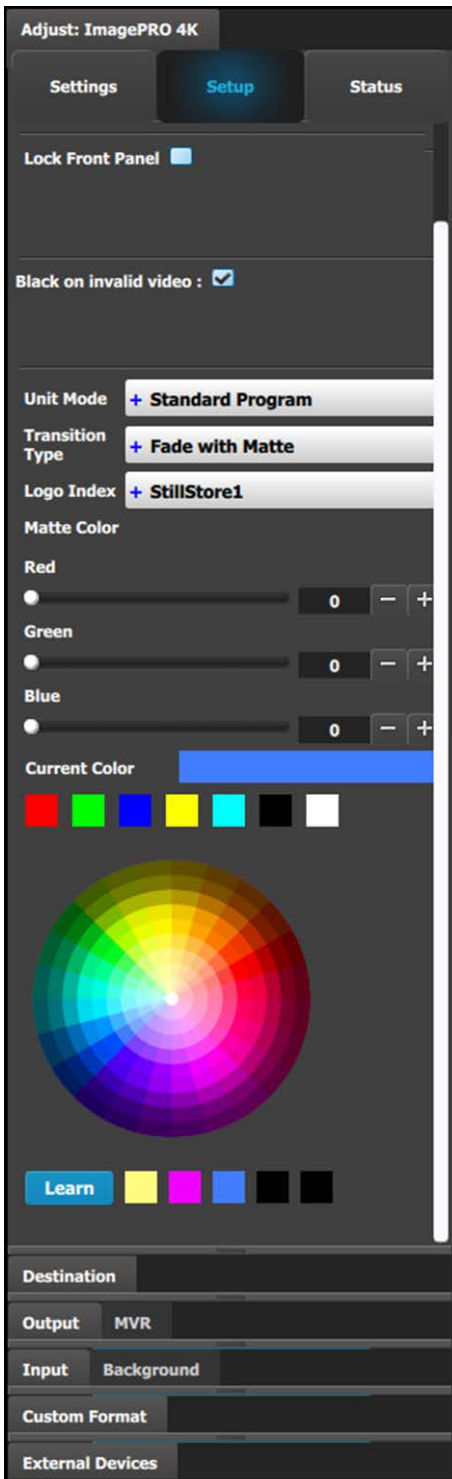


Image 7-4: ImagePRO-4K-specific configuration controls

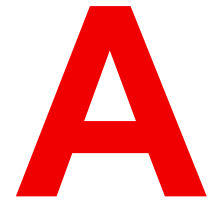

This annex provides information regarding the upgrading of firmware on the ImagePRO-4K.

## B.1 Upgrading firmware using the USB port

### Necessary tools

USB drive (Not supplied by Barco) formatted in FAT32.

### How to upgrade firmware

1. Ensure that your flash drive is formatted to use the FAT32 file system. If necessary, reformat the drive as described in the following section “Formatting the flash drive”.
2. Prepare the flash drive with the upgrade file as described below in the section “Preparing the flash drive with the upgrade file”
  -  **Note:** Upgrading software with the USB port requires the “em\_update\_vp.xx.xx.tar.gz” file to be within a directory named EM.
3. When the drive is ready, refer to the chapter “Performing the firmware upgrade using the USB” describe below for the upgrade procedure.



**CAUTION:** Reformatting the flash drive erases existing data. To avoid losing data, download to a computer or a secure site any files you wish to keep, then format the drive.

### How to format the flash drive

1. Insert the flash drive into a Windows PC or laptop’s USB port.
2. Select a Windows Explorer or a panel allowing an overview on the disk drives and the hardware connected to your computer (e.g. **Start > Computer** on Windows 7 or **Start > My Computer** on Windows XP).
3. On this view, right-click the drive that represents the flash drive.
4. Select **Format** from the menu that appears.

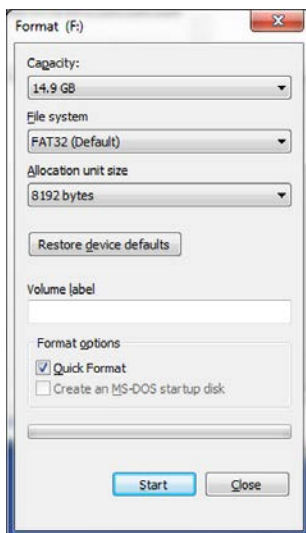


Image B-1: Format Disk screen

5. Select **FAT32** as the file system, and **Quick Format** under **Format Options**, as shown above in the Format Disk screen illustration.

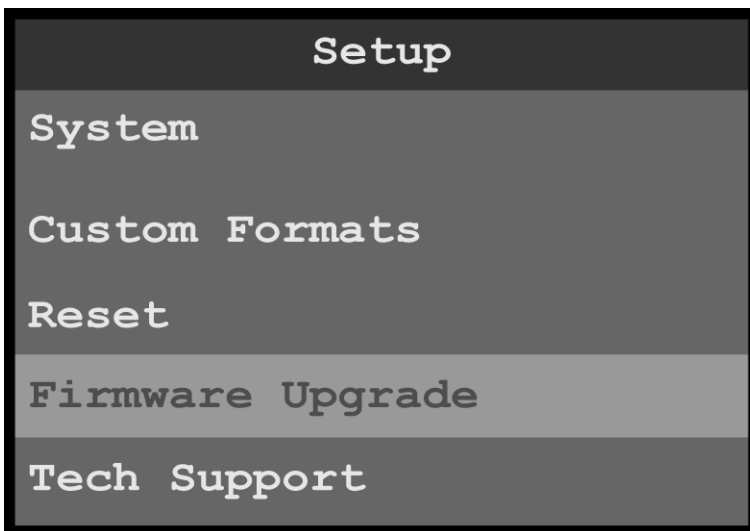


Image B-2: Setup menu: Firmware Upgrade

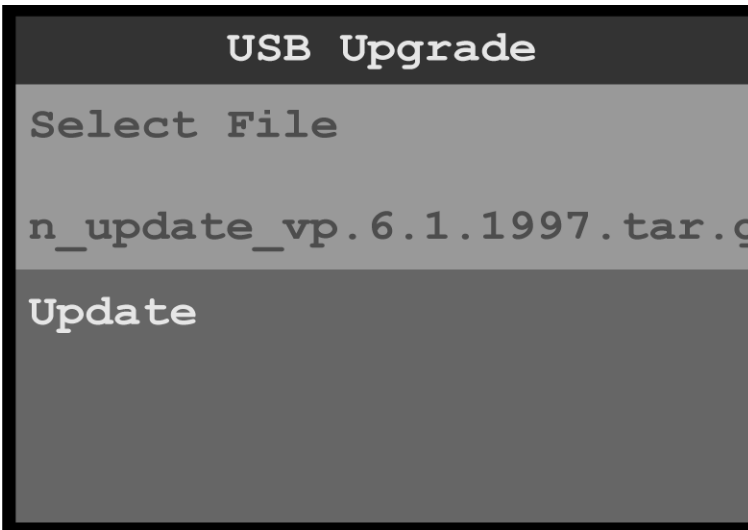


Image B-4: USB Upgrade: Select File

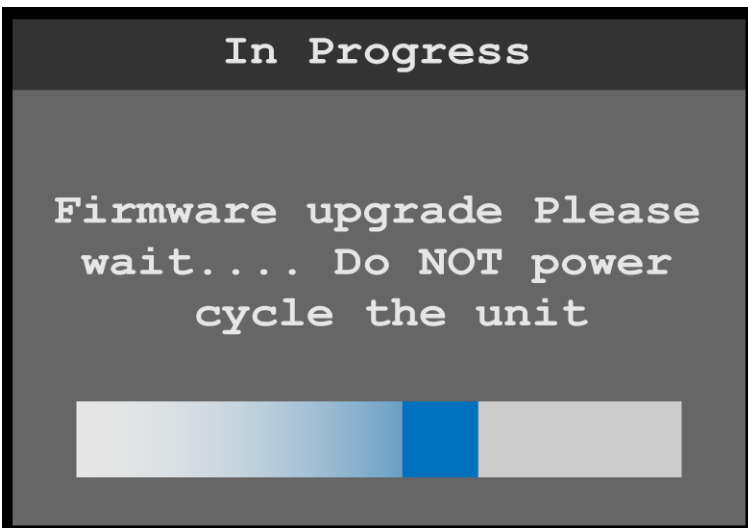
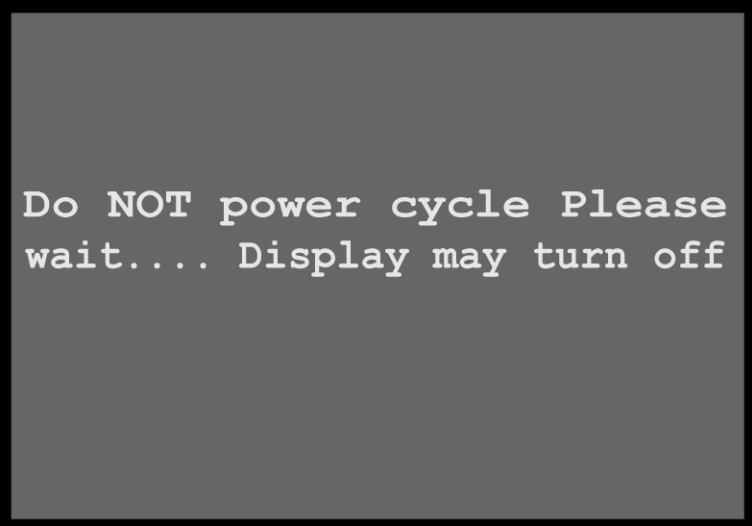


Image B-5: Firmware Upgrade: "In Progress" screen

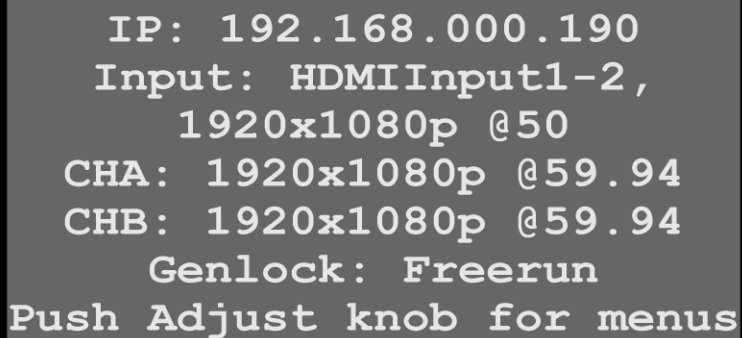

## E.1 About Warranty and RMA

### Warranty

All video products are designed and tested to the highest quality standards and are backed by a full 3-year parts and labor warranty. Warranties are effective upon delivery date to customer and are non-transferable. Barco warranties are only valid to the original purchaser/owner. Warranty related repairs include parts and labor, but do not include faults resulting from user negligence, special modifications, lightning strikes, abuse (drop/crush), and/or other unusual damages.

The customer shall pay shipping charges when unit is returned for repair. Barco will cover shipping charges for return shipments to customers.

### Return Material Authorization (RMA)

RMA Conditions are listed below:

1. Prior to returning any item, you must receive a Return Merchandise Authorization (RMA) number.
2. All RMA numbers must appear on their return-shipping label.
